Striving to be musical heartland

Heartland Sings hosts conference at Rhinehart

Founded in 1997 by Maestro Robert Nance, Fort Wayne's Heartland Sings is a vocal production company featuring 29 professional vocal artists.

Throughout the year, the group put on a diverse array of productions spanning not only choral music, but also opera and musical theater, jazz ensemble, and largescale choral-orchestral works.

Music education and community outreach are integral components of their work, shown in their motto, "changing the lives of participants and patrons through song."

JOIN THE SHOW

From June 16-18, Heartland Sings will be host their first Vocal Arts Conference at Purdue University Fort Wayne.

The conference is a workshop, master class, and educational event for choral singers and music educators, concluding with participants performing a concert with a full orchestra Saturday.

The educational sessions are \$300, but singers who join the chorus can attend all sessions while paying only \$25 for sheet music.

"This is at considerable expense to Heartland Sings, but it was important to us to eliminate all barriers to singers participating," Nance said. "And the singers will get to perform with a full orchestra in front of a nice audience."

If you would like to participate, there is still room, and no audition is required. If you can read music and you have experience singing in your church choir, or any other singing group, you can sign up for a last-minute registration online at heartlandsings.org.

Presenters include Dr. George Shirley, the first African-American to sing lead roles at the Metropolitan Opera; National Medal of Arts recipient Karen Brunssen, past president of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and professor of music at Northwestern University; and Darmon Meader,

vocalist, arranger, saxophonist and director of the Grammy Award-winning group New York Voices.

In addition to the chorus rehearsals, topics presented in workshops and master classes include:

- Choral singing and directing techniques
- Healthy singing from psychological, physical, spiritual, and emotional perspectives
 - Breathing techniques
- Engaging mind-body coordination and vocal vitality throughout the successive stages of life
 - Yoga and the singing voice
- Vocal anatomy and physiology
- A kinesthetic approach to vocal production
- Master classes across various vocal styles

At 4 p.m. on June 18, the choral workshop will join a full orchestra for "Singing for Life" at Rhinehart Music Center Auer Auditorium. Tickets are \$35 in advance and \$40 at the door.

On the program are the contemporary one-act opera *The Three Hermits* by Stephen Paulus and the choral opus *Lux Aeterna* by Morton Lauridsen.

The Three Hermits is a setting of a time-honored story by Leo Tolstoy which demonstrates inclusiveness and how God's love is extended to all humanity.

Lauridsen's 1997 choral cycle *Lux Aeterna* ("Light Eternal") is presented in tribute to those who have been lost to the pandemic.

"We must remind ourselves that our nation has lost one million people, but we can provide a testament to peoples' resilience, and their helpfulness to each other, and to look for positive changes in our community," Nance said.

GIFT OF SONG

Nance has spent decades building this group.

Fort Wayne and the region have always had a strong tradition of singing, not just in choral music, but in all kinds of music.

In the '90s, he saw that amateur singers needed the leadership of professionals to realize their potential.

In those days, he recalls, instrumentalists could make good money doing weddings and parties, while singers weren't being paid according to their talents.

He set out to change that by example, and today Heartland Sings,

which is a registered nonprofit performing arts group, has a staff of full-time paid singers and teachers as well as contract singers to fill out the ranks in concerts.

The immediate future for Heartland Sings is picking up, although Nance is quick to point out that his group was able to continue throughout the last two years. They took every opportunity to stream performances online and to sing in outdoor concerts amid pandemic lockdowns.

He sketched out their next season, which has not yet been announced: A Stephen Sondheim musical theater tribute, the traditional Christmas show, and a March concert on civic and socially conscious themes woven around what he calls "The American Fabric."

"Everyone in the community is a thread in the fabric," Nance said. "We can talk about the textures that creates in our communities."

Nance speaks eloquently about the role music can play in countering the perception of polarization that different parties seek to impose between people.

"I don't think it really exists," he says, flatly.

Next summer will be the second Vocal Arts Conference, this time focusing on jazz and pop singing, and featuring Meader and the New York Voices.

Until then, "We are constantly performing and earning our keep," Nance said.

You better run to nab Benatar, Giraldo tickets

Hall of Fame duo have relied on each other during 40-year career

Everybody knows who Pat Benatar is, so why does she insist, after 35 million albums sold and all her successes, in getting co-billing for her husband, guitarist Neil Giraldo?

Benatar lays it out in her 2010 autobiography *Between a Heart and a Rock Place*: "Without Neil Giraldo ... my career would not have happened. I'm not saying that I wouldn't have had any success as the pop princess Chrysalis (their record label) wanted. But I never would have succeeded to the degree I did, made strides for women, been part of the eighties rock movement, had my face on MTV, won four Grammys, sold millions of records, and still been around thirty years later without the genius and heart of that man."

Now it's 12 years later: Benatar and Giraldo are celebrating their 40th wedding anniversary. They're doing everything on their own terms. And this very year, Benatar and Giraldo will be inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame as a duo.

You'll get the chance to see this duo perform live at the Sweetwater Performance Pavilion on June 19.

EVOLVING TOGETHER

It was in 1979 that Giraldo was introduced to Benatar by the record label artist and repertoire guys, tasked with creating a rock band. Benatar was already an accomplished cabaret singer with exceptional musical training; it was Giraldo that taught her to rock. Benatar had always wanted a band identity, whereas the record label insisted on marketing her as a solo artist.

Album after album, this band that never wanted to repeat themselves kept innovating, and it was Giraldo who was the de facto producer and arranger, though often not credited. His guitar and keyboards are on everything Benatar has recorded. They always made use of the best songwriters the record label and publishing companies brought to them, but Benatar and Giraldo worked steadily at writing their own songs, with contributions by drummer Myron Grombacher.

Listen to their hits with anyone who is a musician, and they'll remind you that Giraldo's guitar riffs are as memorable as Benatar's singing. To this day, a lot of rock guitarists express quiet admiration for Giraldo's powerful, yet concise and melodic solos. Listen to "Promises in the Dark" from 1981, a song that Benatar and Giraldo co-wrote. It's got great chord progressions and what Giraldo liked to call "cinematic" arrangement, something

that takes you through contrasting moods and builds an evocative story through the music in just under five minutes.

But I don't have to remind you that everybody was riveted by Benatar's powerful stage presence and that exceptional voice, which can be earthy and gritty while effortlessly soaring across one of the widest ranges you have heard from any singer, from tenor at the bottom up into the high soprano register. She's always made sure she has something she wants to say with her lyrics as well, taking a feminist stance and using it to conquer hard rock and pop alike.

Listening to their catalog, you get the impression they were fortunate never to be pressured into recording a song they didn't believe in.

RISE TO FAME

Roaring out of the gate in 1979 with the song "Heartbreaker," the band's rise was dramatic. There were female singers in rock and pop, but this distinctive, direct and hard-hitting

sound crafted by Giraldo made Benatar stand out. They developed a penchant for taking songs written for pop and rocking them up: listen to "Hit Me With Your Best Shot," which hit the top 10 on the pop charts in 1980.

Later that year, they had the presence of mind to shoot a short promotional film of them performing "You Better Run," a cover of the Young Rascal's 1966 song.

That's historic because it was the second video aired on a new cable TV network called MTV. It was played in heavy rotation for months because, well, MTV had not had many videos submitted to them yet.

In 1982, they pushed their sound forward into the electronic, recruiting synthesizer player Charlie Giordano. "Love Is a Battlefield," a studio single from their 1983 live album, moved the line between hard rock and pop, absolutely ruled MTV, and inspired a generation of young girls. (You remember Jennifer Garner singing along in the 2004 movie 13 Going On 30, don't you?) A lot of artists copied that sound. If you go to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame Museum in Cleveland, you can see Giraldo's drum machine that he used to program the beats. Their 1985 single "Invincible" bookended that style and remains a concert favorite.

Five platinum albums in the U.S. and four Grammy awards along, the pair had their first child in 1985, and managed to keep the music business machine rolling. But they saw even less need to follow a formula.

Their 1991 album $True\ Love$ saw them playing homage to jump blues, bringing in a horn section.

With the birth of their second child in 1994, it was clear that parenting was as important as making music, and they slowed the pace. Their independent 1997 album *Innamorata* brought in elements of acoustic folk.

Having nothing to prove, in the last 25 years or so they've made the music they want to make on their own terms, doing only brief tours each summer. That's what brings them to Sweetwater.

At a time in life when other classic rock performers are practically expected to augment the band with percussion, extra guitars, keyboards, and backup singers, Benatar and Giraldo are having none of it. Their stage performance is more stripped down and direct than it's ever been: just the two of them with longtime sidemen Mick Mahan on bass and Chris Ralles on drums.

The four of them just turn it up and go for it. That's what we hope to see June 19.

10,000 Maniacs ready to overrun Clyde

Alt rock pioneers marking 40 years during new tour

Somebody has probably made this joke before, but it's a daunting task when you are assigned to interview 10,000 Maniacs.

Talk to 10,000 maniacs? What am I, the US Census Bureau? Then you find out that you only have to interview one Maniac, charming lead singer Mary Ramsey, and it turns out fine.

10,000 Maniacs is, of course, the name of the six-piece band from Jamestown, New York, whose quirky electric folk music held a unique position at the top of the charts on college radio and alternative rock in the 1980s and '90s. Nobody else sounded anything like them, then or now.

You'll get the chance to hear that unique sound when the band visits The Clyde Theatre on Sunday, June 19, while celebrating their 40th anniversary.

"If you want longevity with something, then you have to keep reinventing it, and we've hung in there for a long time," Ramsey said in an interview with *Whatzup*. "There is such interest in the female voice telling the story, and we bring new songs. It's a big basket of a lot of different thing. Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue. We have enough in our catalog to entertain for quite a while."

PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE

Today's Maniacs are Ramsey on vocals and five-string viola, guitarist John Lombardo, keyboardist Dennis Drew, bassist Steve Gustafson, drummer Jerry Augustyniak, and guitarist Jeff Erickson. Backing them on tour is Maggie Zindle on vocals and viola. Four of the men have formed the core of the band since their start in the early 1980s in Jamestown, in the western corner of New York State.

Still looming over them are the shadows of founding singer Natalie Merchant, who left the band for a solo career in 1993, and founding guitarist Robert Buck, who died in

In the early '80s, 10,000 Maniacs made a connection with Athens, Georgia, band R.E.M., the only group that seemed like their peers. The Maniacs' breakthrough came as they opened for R.E.M. during a 1985 tour, supporting their major label debut album *The Wishing Chair*, which got significant critical acclaim, but no hits.

Following their debut album, they had a run of three albums from 1987-92 that sold a combined 5 million copies in the US.

Their sophomore effort, 1987's *In My Tribe*, brought them into the top 10 of the alternative rock chart with singles including "Like the Weather" and "What's the Matter Here?" With Merchant's warm though somehow distant voice, and the band's gentle, midtempo folk sound, jangly

guitars, and slightly cheesy organ, they could take on topics from depression to child abuse, and address them from a grown-up, feminine perspective. The band paved a path for the female-fronted alternative rock bands that would follow in the '90s.

In 1989, Blind Man's Zoo brought the hit "Trouble Me," an uplifting, easygoing song from an otherwise pessimistic album. It went to the top of the alternative rock chart while also hitting top 10 on the adult contemporary chart, making a mark on mainstream rock and the Billboard Hot 100 as well. The Maniacs were everywhere.

The 1992 release *Our Time in Eden* was a lavishly-produced affair with horns and strings. It was also Ramsey's introduction to the band, as she was a session viola player

who would go on to tour as backing vocalist. The band continued to ride high with "These Are Days" and "Candy Everybody Wants," which were by turns uplifting and deeply ironic.

Their 1993 MTV Unplugged broadcast was released as a block-buster album that sold more than 3 million copies, but Merchant had long planned an exit to become a solo artist.

With her having stepped into a difficult role 25 years ago, after all the time since, I wanted to ask Ramsey if it finally feels comfortable this time around.

"Yes, it does," she said. "It is second nature in terms of performing. It's not about trying to replace Natalie Merchant. It's about honoring her. I really feel like that. And I hope she thinks the same way."

TIME FOR REVIVAL

The band's comeback album, 1997's Love Among the Ruins, was their first with Ramsey as lead singer. It produced their highest-charting studio single ever, their cover of Roxy Music's "More Than This." The band had a successful tour of theaters, but the album did not chart.

While members of the band toured as often as they could, the years since would see the founding members and Ramsey reunite twice to produce albums, funded independently.

During the pandemic the band started collaborating again in anticipation of their big milestone, their 40th anniversary. They celebrated with a concert in Jamestown on May 21 to a sold-out crowd of 1,500 in the grand old Palace Theater, now called the Reg Lenna Center.

I spoke to a rather exhausted, yet cheerful, Ramsey from her home in Buffalo, New York, just two days after that, and was amazed to learn she had been struggling with laryngitis for three weeks, but went on performing anyway. She even did some sets with John & Mary, her long-running project with Maniacs guitarist John Lombardo.

As for what it feels like to keep a band going from the 1900s into the 2000s, Ramsey joked, "Everybody who's in the group now has been in the group for two centuries."

Celebrating an anniversary just as it has become possible to resume touring has been a strange experience.


"I can't quite explain it," she said. I can't figure it out totally. We've never really had as many people come to our shows as this is happening now, with vim and vigor, and also familiarity with our songs.

"We've been very busy since the pandemic lifted, but before that we were working on stuff," she added. "We have a lot of new songs and it's not going to take very long for us to put an album together."

Will we hear some new songs in Fort Wayne?

"Yes, you will," she said.

Christian metal coming to Piere's


On Friday, Sept. 16, Piere's welcomes the American Christian metal band **Demon Hunter.**

On Tuesday, June 14, the Three Rivers Art Center will host its seventh annual RiverDrums event at Promenade Park from 4-10 p.m.

RiverDrums is a free, multicultural celebration focusing on diversity and unity.

The opening ceremony will celebrate peace, with Mayor Tom Henry on hand and artistic director Patty Hunter reading her poem, "Ukraine Plight."

Ukraine native Tatyana Hutcherson, who organized a Fort Wavne rally for Ukraine in March, will also be part of the ceremony.

The opening ceremony will also include RiverDrums' staff and their children singing. "We Shall Overcome."

RiverDrums will feature an array of new performers this year.

The first of these is the Terrible Orchestra, a 25-person group that was founded as a nonjudgmental space to give lapsed musicians a second chance to perform.

Also joining the event is the Fort Wayne Scottish Pipes and Drums Band, bringing bagpipes to the festival for the first time.

Lastly, RiverDrums will welcome Pimyotamah Hartleroad, a member of the Miami Tribe of Oklahoma.

This tribe originated in what is now Fort Wayne, before being removed by force. Hartleroad is joining the event as this year's

Middle Waves crashing back into Fort Wayne

Popular music festival with national, local acts setting up at Foellinger

From 2016-2018, Middle Waves built a strong reputation and gained national recognition for finding a diverse musical offering of the "next big things" to go along with a plethora of local talent.

A planned year off in 2019 turned into three years due to the pandemic, leaving organizers to hope they could once again build momentum at a new venue, moving the event from Headwaters Park to the Foellinger Theatre campus, where it will be June 17-18.

BACK ON TRACK

For the uninitiated, the Middle Waves Music Festival is a two-day destination music festival where indie, hip-hop, and rock music coexist.

The last Middle Waves Festival was in September 2018 at Headwaters, after which organizers decided to switch from a fall date to a summer get-together, taking a year off in 2019 to allow enough time to adequately plan.

The festival had confirmed a move to the new Electric Works campus for 2020. However, with the lineup set and tickets on already sale, the event was canceled in early April.

"At that point, pretty much everything was done and ready to go," said Beth McAvoy, co-chair of Middle Waves, in a recent interview with *Whatzup*.

The full gravity of the pandemic had yet to be realized, so there was some pushback from fans who didn't understand why the event had been canceled.

"I'm sure we made the right call, and it was kind of the same scenario with last summer's uncertainty," McAvoy said. "So, when we started the planning process for this year's festival, it was with a lot of trepidation about how things were going to be this summer. Fortunately, it seems like we're are all in a lot better spot to have an outdoor event."

GOING NATIONAL

With that three-year layoff in the rear-view mirror, McAvoy is optimistic the festival will return to form quickly because of the fantastic artists they were able to book this year. It is, however, cautious optimism.

"I feel like the lineup we have for this year, particularly with being able to bring back Big Boi on Friday, and then having Young the Giant on Saturday, is probably the strongest pair of headliners we've had from a reach standpoint," McAvoy said, referencing Big Boi also being booked for the 2020 show that was

canceled. "But the world is in a different place than it was in 2020. I just hope people are able to come out and support it, and see this kind of thing in their backyard."

In addition to the aforementioned headliners, attendees will also get the chance to see Carroll High School graduate-turned-national pop/hip-hop star Lauren Sanderson, 20-year-old singer/songwriter Rosie, indie rockers *repeat repeat, and Toronto-based Kiwi Jr. on the pavilion stage.

FREE EVENTS TO CHECK OUT

While those acts will require paid entry, the festival will have plenty of free offerings, including a community stage outside of the main venue featuring local and regional acts. There will also be a vendor village directly in front of the pavilion selling a variety of items.

This makes two-thirds of the festival a free, all-ages event.

"We hope to have a long-term relationship with the parks department and Foellinger Theatre," McAvoy said. "I think it's a great opportunity to bring a new audience to this really unique asset in our community that some people haven't been to before."

LINEUP DECISIONS

Of course, everyone has an opinion about who made it onto this year's lineup, and who

"should have been" on the lineup, but McAvoy assures us that those decisions are not made haphazardly. In fact, a great deal of work is put into deciding who eventually gets booked.

The all-volunteer booking committee spends a lot of time scouring social media, watching live performances on YouTube, and looking for artists that not only have great music but prove themselves to be great performers.

"That's a huge thing," McAvoy said, "because it's not just about a big name. We want people to deliver one helluva live show for people as well."

The committee also looks at numbers artists accumulate on streaming services like Spotify and Pandora.

"We really try to get a diverse lineup," McA-voy said. "We're not just a one- or two-genre festival, though. Of course, we are always trying to find incredible headliners, but we're also trying to find the next big band. We've had Idles here, who are second line of Bonnaroo this year and, of course, Lizzo. We're

aways trying to discover things that you could potentially hear first."

McAvoy recommends that if you plan to attend Middle Waves, whether it's to see a particular artist or just to experience what the festival has to offer, you should bring an open mind.

"Come experience something new and unique and different in your city," she said. "I guarantee there's going to be something that you'll enjoy. Whether it's a great food truck, supporting your favorite local bands, or discovering a new band you didn't know about. We really feel like we've put together a quality experience for people."

KEEP PARTY GOING

Adding to that experience on Saturday night is the official Middle Waves after party, After-Waves, at Flashback Live. Festival ticketholders will get in free to the Wells Street night club with music beginning around 10:30 p.m. Local sensations Namen Namen will take the stage at that time, followed by Lübs.

There are still tickets available for both events, and McAvoy said Middle Waves is still in need of volunteers for just about every function. She said volunteers will be given the chance to purchase a discounted ticket.

Following hiatus, Anti-Clutch back with new singer

"After meeting the band for the first time, they ran through some songs and I just freestyled some vocals, and we all just enjoyed the way everything fit and meshed together," Sanders said. "To me, I feel that we all complemented each other's styles and synchronized pretty well together.

"What I really enjoy about this band is that they have groovy technical punchy riffs that work well with my pummeling simplistic fight riffs and breakdowns," he added.

Rounding out the band is **Zach Lahrman** on bass and **Gabriel Talamantes** on drums. Together, they have a polished live set and are always writing new material. In fact, they are in the process of finalizing their first single.

With Anti-Clutch all healed up and ready to go, expect some new music and gigs to be

Spins local and national album reviews

Plumdingo

Awkward Coffee

Plumdingo is a Fort Wayne band that has been rocking stages for six years. They've got a loose vibe to their sound — one minute alternative



rock ala Smashing Pumpkins, the next a Weimar cabaret number. The band makes groove-heavy tracks that are easy to get lost in after a beer or two. Don't drink? That's cool, because you'll still have a good time.

Plumdingo consists of Dusty Brown on vocals and keyboard, Tim Becker on guitar and vocals, Tracy Zion on drums, and Leiah Osborne on bass. Their latest release is the eclectic *Awkward Coffee*, a 13-track long player that displays the band's expansive musical interests from Bowie-esque ballads to Gish-era Pumpkins guitar glee. It's a vast and all-immersive listen.

If variety is indeed the spice of life, then Awkward Coffee is the ghost pepper of local albums. You're never treated to the same thing twice. From the heavy opener "Angry Gods in Confidence" and its Temple of the Dog heft, to the cabaret of "Blackbird" and the ethereal "House of Cards," Plumdingo comes at us with all the vibes.

"Lazy Eyed Girl" locks into the early '90s hippy vibe of bands like Spin Doctors and Blues Traveler with touches of early REM. There is an overall feel that this album is a collective, not so much a band but a community of like-minded artists coming together and bringing their vision to life. Becker and Brown build their tracks with the band, making these tunes a band effort. "Dinosaurs Are Skeletons," "Just Another Moment," and "Fame In Tragedy" close the album out on groove and touches of funk.

Awkward Coffee is a great showcase for a band pulling influence and inspiration every which way, while also keeping Plumdingo more of a collective. It's like-minded musicians coming together to make something groovy, eclectic, and engaged. – J. Hubner

Wilco

Cruel Country

If you watch I Am Trying To Break Your Heart, the 2002 documentary that follows the making of Wilco's Yankee Hotel Foxtrot album, you'll



see the point where the band decides whether it will stick to the path it's been on or head somewhere new. The film focused on the tension between frontman Jeff Tweedy and the late Jay Bennett, the band's guitarist. Bennett continually pushed to make straight-foward, energetic songs like those on the band's first few albums, while Tweedy disdainfully dismissed these "rockers" in favor of a more experimental approach.

The next 20 years would have Tweedy as the sole captain of the Wilco ship, and

experimentation was the course the band was on. With the release of the new double album *Cruel Country*, there's a tease that Wilco's music may be getting back to its alt-country roots after all this time. But that tease is only partially delivered.

The album's title is a double entendre, referring both to the genre Tweedy has spent decades running from and the conflicted, messy nation he finds himself living in.

The latter is well-covered, with many songs in which Tweedy muses on the country he both loves and fears for.

But *Cruel Country* isn't a country music album. It does touch on some of the genre ground that Wilco has previously covered, but it's more often the folk of *Mermaid Avenue* or the California pop of *Summerteeth*. No matter what style peeks through, though, they're all background interludes supporting Tweedy's evocative poetry.

For non-fans, *Cruel Country* will likely be a long, difficult-to-endure slog through 21 somber-tempoed tracks. For loyal Jeff Tweedy followers, it's a hefty example of his lyrical prowess. And for old-school fans who long for the Wilco of the 1990s, it'll probably be a disappointment. – *Evan Gillespie*

Joel Ross

Parable of the Poet

Joel Ross is part of the new wave of artists continuing a decades-long journey in creating evocative and forward-thinking music in the realm



of jazz. The Chicago-born, New York City-based vibraphonist released his debut in 2019 titled *Kingmaker* with Blue Note Records and established himself as a musician and composer to watch. His music is personal and elaborate, following in the footsteps of pioneers like Lionel Hampton, Bobby Hutcherson, Gary Burton, and Milt Jackson.

On Ross' newest release (and third for Blue Note) titled *The Parable of the Poet*, Ross conducts the eight-piece band through seven musical pieces that make up an album-length suite. *Parable* is at times melancholy, at times triumphant, and always engaging.

The Parable of the Poet comes off like a score to a dream. Light in moments while heavy and intellectually engaging in others, Ross has written an album of depth and musical prodigiousness. The vibes are front and center, but opening piece "Prayer" wouldn't be as effective without Sean Mason's subtle piano or Marquis Hill's trumpet. It's an absolutely gorgeous piece that brings us into the fold of Ross' vision.

"Guilt" and "Choices" continue with subtle shifts with emphasis on the brass giving the latter an almost New Orleans feel.

A real shift comes in the dramatic "Wail," a tumultuous 10 minutes of alto sax and brass, bringing the power and heaviness of something like *A Love Supreme*. Ross has eloquence and quiet moments within this storm of a track, but this feels like the centerpiece of the record.

Backtracks CLASSIC ALBUMS

MC5

High Time (1971)

The second and final studio album from Detroit's proto-punk rockers is quintessential listening for anyone with a great



appreciation for American rock n' roll. It never takes its foot off the gas and is one of the most underappreciated records from 1971.

"Sister Anne" opens the release with snappy percussion behind crafty guitars and horns that borrow from both the '50s and '60s. Fred Smith's harmonica pulls it all together to blend boogie with heavy rock and a hint of punk. "Baby Won't Ya" has a bluesy-prog vibe that feels eerily like Jeff Beck and The New York Dolls in its arrangement.

More sonic guitars from Wayne Kramer give this one a nice thump as well for almost six minutes. "Miss X" staggers around for over five minutes, and if this were their "ballad," it's soaked in sincerity, grit, and passion.

Side two grabs the hard rock shroud again and tears it off with "Future/Now" that grinds the same guitars around for several minutes before the psychedelic bridge takes you on an electric-folk journey as it fades into the night. "Poison" is proto-punk that drags you into the pit before the magnificent "Over and Over." If I ever join a band, "Over and Over" is the first song I'd like to learn and cover.

For 1971, it checks all the boxes for hard rock and lyrically meets the protest atmosphere of the Vietnam era, and the guitars tie the whole thing together beautifully. The album closes with "Skunk (Sonicly Speaking)," a brassy, bombastic track that represents the band at their best.

Unfortunately, drugs crept into the band, and this was the last thing they ever produced with all the original members. MC5 were, and still are, one of the best American bands. Kick out the jams. – *Dennis Donahue*

"Benediction" is the calm after the storm, a beautiful piano-led piece that closes the book on this parable.

There's not a lagging second on this album. Joel Ross has written a work of grand musical statements, giving us both a piece for jazz ensemble while also veering into modern classical as well. The line between composition and improvisation is blurred to the point of not being there. The Parable of the Poet is a singular work from one of the finest jazz musicians/composers working today.

Emo festival in Cincinnati


Cincinnati's Riverbend Music Center is the place emo fans will want to be when the "Is For Lovers" festival stops there Sept. 8.



Top Gun continues to cruise at No. 1

om Cruise's new massive hit. Top Gun: Maverick, took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office for the second straight weekend, selling another \$86 million, upping the film's 10-day domestic sales total to a whopping \$291 million.

So far, the film has not only made \$549 million worldwide, but has received some of the loudest acclaim and word-of-mouth of any film of recent memory.



I have a maybe-bold prediction, and I'm going to make it without having seen the film: Top Gun: Maverick will be nominated for the Best Picture Oscar next year. It won't win, but it'll win the Oscar for sound editing and Cruise will be a part of the ceremony in some way.

Sam Raimi's Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness took the No. 2 spot at the box office during its fifth weekend of release, selling another \$9.2 million and upping its worldwide sales to a remarkable \$909 million. Whoa. What if Sam Raimi ends up with a film that eclipses \$1 billion?

The Bob's Burgers Movie took the No. 3 spot at the box office over its third weekend, selling another \$4.5 million. The animated film has made \$22 million over 10 days. Sounds about right.

Rounding out last weekend's top five were The Bad Guys (No. 4 with \$3.4 million in sales) and Downton Abbey: A New Era (No. 5 with just under \$3 million in sales).

New this week

The summer blockbuster was directed by Colin Trevorrow, his second Jurassic film and fifth feature. This one will be a bit of a comeback for the director, who was replaced by J.J. Abrams while directing 2019's Star Wars: The Rise of Skywalker.

Anyhow, this flick will be huge. Massive. It'll almost certainly take the No. 1 spot away from Cruise.

New thriller not really worth watching

In the opening shot of the new thriller *Watcher*, Julia (Maika Monroe) looks out a taxi window with a glimmer of excitement at the Bucharest buildings that surround her new residence. She and her husband, Francis (Karl Glusman), have just moved from the U.S. to Romania for work, even though Julia doesn't know the language nearly as well as her hubby. She spends her first days there working to remedy the linguistic barrier, listening to foreign language courses while discovering

the city on foot.

But bumming around Bucharest gets much more tense by the presence of Daniel (Burn Gorman), an across-the-way neighbor who too frequently looks into the married couple's apartment window and who Julia suspects may be following her around as well.

Watcher is the first feature from writer/director Chloe Okuno, and while it may not be the most auspicious debut, there are signs of prom-

ise in the way she brings the audience into this tale.

Like Monroe's 2014 breakthrough *It Follows*, it's all about putting us in the mindset that the protagonist could be in danger and under pursuit at any moment. Up until the final 15 minutes, the pace and rhythm are in line with a slow-burn thriller, although it can feel more like it's spinning its wheels rather than calculatedly creaking them for effect.

Where *Watcher* falls flat is in the scant screenplay, adapted by Okuno from a script written originally by Zack Ford. There is shockingly little character development amid the limited ensemble; a next-door neighbor played by Madalina Anea may be the most well-rendered person in the film, and she's really only in a few scenes.

Okuno does a fine job setting up the scenario of whether or not Julia is actually in danger and considering what she should do about it, but the conflicts therein too often become redundant. I understand that Okuno is more concerned with establishing a mood of unease rather than writing scenes of lengthy dialogue, but nevertheless, there has to be a compelling narrative to make the atmospheric scenes resonate.

From a story perspective, *Watcher* plays like a Eurotrash mash-up of two classics, one from a very similar genre and another from a different genre entirely.

Roman Polanski's horror film *Repulsion*, which also follows a young woman's descent into paranoia through her perceived encounters with menacing men, seems to have been a touchstone for Okuno while making this film. While existential dramedy *Lost in Translation* isn't scary, I was often reminded of Scarlett Johansson's Charlotte when watching Monroe's Julia try to find herself in an intimidating new city.

Glusman's Francis also shares similarities with Giovanni Ribisi's *Translation* character, both blasé workaholics whose disinterest in their wives' satisfaction (and well-being, in *Watcher*'s case) should land them in hot water more than it actually does.

Glusman hasn't made much of an impact on me in his filmography, and he's a total bore as a character who needs sharper definition to make the relationship angle of this movie work. It doesn't help that he and Monroe have little to no chemistry, although it's possible that was somewhat intentional.

Monroe is a talented young actress, and this should theoretically be as much a showcase for her abilities as *It Follows* was eight years ago, but this project just isn't up to her level. It's hard to tell what on the page drew her to this role, but I hope she's able to find better scripts in the future if for no other reason than to firmly retain her scream queen status.

Watcher wears the guise of better voyeuristic thrillers, but it's ultimately not much more than window dressing.




