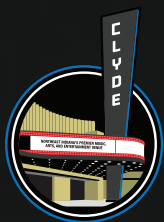

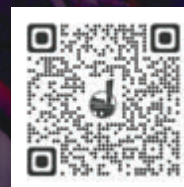

Fundraiser aimed at keeping Maumee clean

Sixth annual event will be held at The Phoenix

Fort Wayne is filled with events and festivals during the summer season. Not all of them, however, support such a vital cause as the Save Maumee Fundraiser.

Six years strong, Save Maumee Grassroots Organization's annual fundraiser is not only a fantastic time for the whole family, but an important financial source for the eco-friendly nonprofit.

This year's event will be Sunday, June 26, at The Phoenix.

FOR OUR RIVERS

Save Maumee is a volunteer-based nonprofit that revolves around environmentalism, with a stated goal of protecting the ecosystems of the Upper Maumee River.

Save Maumee takes on degraded waterways by replacing invasive species with native ones, including a multitude of trees and grasses that existed in the area prior to European descent.

Through this rehabilitation, habitats are restored for wildlife and insects, among many other environmental benefits that improve the overall quality of our waterways.

The organization's current project has been dubbed the Rose Ave Rehab. Funding for this project goes toward purchasing native plants, as well as the purchase of a wind-powered aeration device to provide oxygen to the waterway.

According to Lauren Conklin, vice president of Save Maumee and organizer of the event, funds made from this year's event will go toward this extensive project.

A BRIEF HISTORY

Save Maumee's annual fundraiser hasn't always been as large-scale as it is today.

The first fundraiser was actually a yard sale, Conklin said, before the organization began receiving grants. Volunteers donated their household items to be sold at the sale, with profits going to the organization.

It wasn't until a paint-a-long fundraiser at The Phoenix a few years later that the idea for a big fundraiser, like the one this year, was broached. It was around this time that Conklin became more involved in the organization, and ever since, she has played a huge role in making these sizable fundraisers happen.

In 2018, Save Maumee held their first bazaar, which Conklin described as a "big party." The event was massive, with over 50 vendors, a maker space, and performers. The organization held another bazaar in 2019.

But with COVID in 2020, the events, and the volunteer force, were pulled back for good reason.

With the 2021 outdoor event dampened by rain, Save Maumee is looking for a bounce-back year.

"Everybody is trying to find their groove again," Conklin said. "This year's event is a nice welcome back."

PLENTY OF FUN

The 2022 Save Maumee fundraiser sees change from years past, including being held indoors. Also, there will no longer be an excess of



vendors. Instead, there will be live entertainment, food trucks, artists, and raffles.

The event is meant to be a "fun party for volunteers," according to Conklin. She hopes the event is not only a great time, but an inspiring one for potential volunteers.

"It's a really good way to bring people in," she said.

The MC for the event will be Mark Lahey, who will keep the event moving and announce raffle winners.

Seven live painters will also be on hand, and they will be selling their work via silent auction and donating the proceeds to the organization.

Get up close and personal with WWII aircrafts

*Tours, rides available
when planes stop by
Fort Wayne Aero Center*

Hunched over a walker, he moved closer to the warbird. He motioned, and his daughter helped him to his feet as he inched closer to the ladder. Proudly, he made his way up the ladder, got inside, and sat down. A smile formed.

For a moment, the frail veteran was once again an 18-year-old gunner on a B-29. This was the first, and maybe last, time aboard the plane since the war ended. For years he was quiet, keeping his tale to himself.

For anyone who will listen, he will tell his story. The story of the hum of the engine, and how his heart raced not knowing if he would return home to his base, let alone the family farm.

Anyone around him is transfixed on his courage and unmasked humility.

It doesn't happen as much as it used to, said Jacques Robitaille, a spokesman for Commemorative Air Force. But it does happen, and it's always a poignant moment. That's why they fly to dozens of cities on their AirPower Tour every year.

It's a rare chance to get a first-hand look at historic aircraft that won World War II. But it's also a tribute to men and women of the Greatest Generation.

"We put these planes at fingertips' reach for people who aren't going to be able to see the planes," Robitaille said. "We provide context to an incredible time in history."

CAF's AirPower Tour will be at Fort Wayne International Airport's Aero Center to the main terminal June 30-July 4. The five-day visit puts legendary World War II aircraft up close and personal with cockpit tours and rides.

The tour includes legendary warbirds, such as the B-29 Superfortress, B-24 Liberator, and P-51 Mustang. Also sharing the tarmac are training planes, T-6 Texan and PT-13 Stearman.

ONE-OF-A-KIND EXPERIENCE

It's one thing to see a World War II plane in photos, videos, or even in static display, but CAF offers a whole different experience.

"That's what's unique about this," Robitaille said. "In museums, the planes are far away. They are behind a rope or a barrier of some kind. You can't get up close, and you certainly can't get it inside."

The AirPower Tour takes it further, Robitaille said. "It's an opportunity for folks that would normally (want) to see a B-29 or B-24 be able to touch them, be able to hear the roar

when the engines start up, see the smoke belt out, hear the noise, and really get a sense of what it was like when these airplanes were firing up and get ready to go out on a mission."

That means, to really understand the planes, one must go inside.

"They will be opened up, and folks will be able to take a walk through the airplane," Robitaille said. "They walk through the bomb bay, go up into the cockpit area, and come back out."

STAR OF THE SHOW

The tour will make more than two dozen stops through November, and almost every one gets the same response.

The B-29 "FIFI" immediately makes a splash. The plane alone has enough historical significance to draw attention. The B-29 were tasked with dropping the two atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945.

Robitaille said the plane is an engineering marvel.

"The technical innovation that went into the production of this aircraft, and the creation of this aircraft, just astounds me," he said.

FIFI has been part of the CAF's stable since the 1970s, undergoing a four-year renovation,



complete with hybrid engines. It's considered the premier prop-driven aircraft of the era. It was also one of the largest of the war, a four-engine beast with pressurized cabins and computerized machine guns that could carry as much as 20,000 pounds of bombs at speeds of more than 200 miles per hour.

"You'll recognize once you get on the B-29 just how big it is, especially compared to those other planes," Robitaille said.

Those who have never been in the cockpit of a B-29 may feel like they've seen it before.

"A lot of folks say it looks just like the cockpit of the Millennium Falcon from *Star Wars*. It's not by accident," Robitaille said. "George Lucas actually took his inspiration for that from the cockpit of the B-29."

SUPPORTING CAST

The Liberator Diamond Lil was one of the first B-24s produced. Like the B-29, it was a decisive weapon in the Allies' air arsenal.

It's a fast, long-range, heavy bomber with precision bombing accuracy. More than 18,000 were produced, and they protected Allied transport shipping against submarines in the battle of the Atlantic, devastated the Axis industry, and were strategic in ground

campaigns.

The T-6 Texan is a trainer for fighter pilots. In fact, the majority of Allied pilots in World War II earned their wings flying in one. According to CAF, 34 nations used them with hundreds of thousands of fliers going behind the yoke. It was dream to maintain, and was built to provide an outlet for aerial combat tactics.

The PT-13 Stearman is a biplane with significant wood and fabric. It looks similar to World War I fighter planes, and Robitaille said it offers a unique experience.

"It's is an open cockpit aircraft, and so a ride on that is the wind in your face," he said. "It's just a fun ride."

The P-51 Mustang fighter is also scheduled to appear. Robitaille describes it as a "premier fighter, and one of the most famous aircraft of the war." It was used extensively as an escort for bombers in Europe. They could fly as high as 41,000 feet and had long range capability of as much as 1,300 miles. With six machine guns, they were effective at supporting ground troops. It was the aircraft used by the historic Tuskegee Airmen, topping 430 miles per hour.

KEEPING THE PLANES IN AIR

Admission and paid rides help cover the costs of maintaining the planes, and bomber rides will be offered Saturday and Sunday morning.

"It's an all-volunteer organization," Robitaille said. "Even the pilots have donated their time, that's what makes it special. No one is here unless they want to be. The tour leaders, the pilots, (with the exception of mechanics), and everyone else, we do this as a labor of love."

It's not just fuel, it's hanger costs, insurance, all the overhead, and everything else that goes into keeping the planes flying and sharing the stories of the men and women who participated in the war effort.

It's a costly mission, according to Robitaille. "One of the reasons we go on tour is because it's our fundraising effort, how we make our money to keep these airplanes flying," he said. "It costs well over a million dollars a year to maintain and operate these airplanes."

He said they invest more than 100 hours of maintenance into every hour of flight. That is paid for by visitors to the CAF tour stops: buying tickets, rides, and donating.

Philharmonic blasts off with Patriotic Pops

Free holiday programs taking place in region to celebrate Fourth of July

It's grown to be one of the best ways to kick off Independence Day around northeast Indiana.

It's unapologetically big, bold, and brassy.

The Fort Wayne Philharmonic's Patriotic Pops series is headlined by *Moonshot: A Homerun Celebration* on July 3 at Parkview Field, a tribute to all that makes up the American experience.

ACROSS THE POND

In delicious irony, a British conductor will lead the celebration at Parkview Field. Music director Andrew Constantine is quick to laugh when he thinks about it.

"I'm more American, because I chose to be an American," he said.

That doesn't mean he won't play on the notion of being on the wrong side of history when it comes to the American Revolution.

His admission of his British roots brings the emotions of pride and enjoyment to concertgoers, while being able to poke fun at himself.

"Together," he said. "Using all of that together is what makes up a rather complicated musician from the north of England who now lives in Maryland, and conducts in Indiana."

A SERIES OF PATRIOTIC EVENTS

The July 3 event is the penultimate, marquee event of the Patriotic Pops series.

The tour starts June 24 at DeKalb Outdoor Theater in Auburn before visiting Oakwood Resort in Syracuse, Pokagon State Park in Angola, and Bixler Lake Park in Kendallville, and is conducted by Caleb Young, the Philharmonic's guest conductor

for engagement.

Patriotic Pops travels to introduce people to the Philharmonic in a non-threatening way. Constantine said it's important for people to understand that just because they aren't familiar with classical or orchestra music doesn't mean they have to be intimidated.

Constantine said Patriotic Pops gives concertgoers a chance to experience a new level of music performance with familiar tunes.

"There's a lot of stuff that goes on that makes up the musical fabric of America, without all the intimidation," he said. "Patriotic Pops is a fun, peppy, upbeat night of fun."

The July 3 concert at Parkview Field will feature Armed Forces tributes, classics like "Yankee Doodle Dandy," and subtle tips of the hat to American culture with a Beach Boys medley, fireworks, the *Star Wars* theme, John Phillip Sousa marches including "Stars and Stripes Forever," and Tchaikovsky's "Overture of 1812."

Even though it's an homage to Russian resistance of France, it's become a holiday favorite. Its tradition dates to the Boston Pops in 1970.

Constantine said he worked hard to paint a unique yet powerful picture with his musical selections.

"I think there's a real collection here of everything that's positive about the American spirit and the American vision," he said.

You have a juxtaposition of such, like "Good Vibrations," "California Girls," and "When Jesus Wept."

The concert also includes Fort Wayne native Ian Williams as host. He'll lead a ballpark singalong and the national anthem.

There will be a presentation highlighting the 100th anniversary

of the birth of renowned fashion icon Bill Blass, who was born in Fort Wayne and died in 2002.

Lest concertgoers forget the venue is a ballpark, many of the features of a TinCaps baseball game will be available, including concessions, mascot Johnny TinCap, and access to the batting cages.

PROUD TO BE AN AMERICAN

Constantine said the Homerun Celebration is worth the effort that is put into it. It also adds to his pride in his American citizenship.

"People love it because it means so much deep down," he said. "And I honestly think that when people go to the Fourth of July, they're thinking about so many aspects of their lives, rather than just the euphoria that's going on around the music."

He said it's also a practical way to understand what it means to be an American. "It's very important to us to reflect on the sacrifices people have made, which is why doing something like an Armed Forces medley is so important."

In every note, every beat, there's this message that expresses an American independence, resilience, and special connectedness to the world community. And a country with people of all backgrounds who want to do the right thing.

"Most of the world says, 'They're just Americans, and that's their

problem,'" Constantine said. "But a high percentage of people around the world also hope they'll live in America, because they see an aspirational society and an aspirational way of life."

"The notion of an American dream means a lot of things to a lot of different people, but fundamentally it's an opening, an opportunity, and it's what you make of it," he added.

Even with historical problems, America still has a lot to admire, Constantine said.

"We're accused of a lot in this country," he said. "And I can understand that, because it kind of harkens to the past, which probably wasn't as ideal as people like to think. At the same time, there were a lot of great values within those times that are carried forward."

Constantine said it's a special night for a special place: something that says "Only in America."

"It's hard not to get swept along with the (Parkview) concert, with the whole evening," he said. "It brings the whole community together, and it shows one fundamental that I think is an important part of the message, which is that music unites like nothing else does. You can feel a bond with the person next to you, and it's through the music that spins it."

After a three-year hiatus, concertgoers returned for two days of live music, food trucks, vendors, and art.

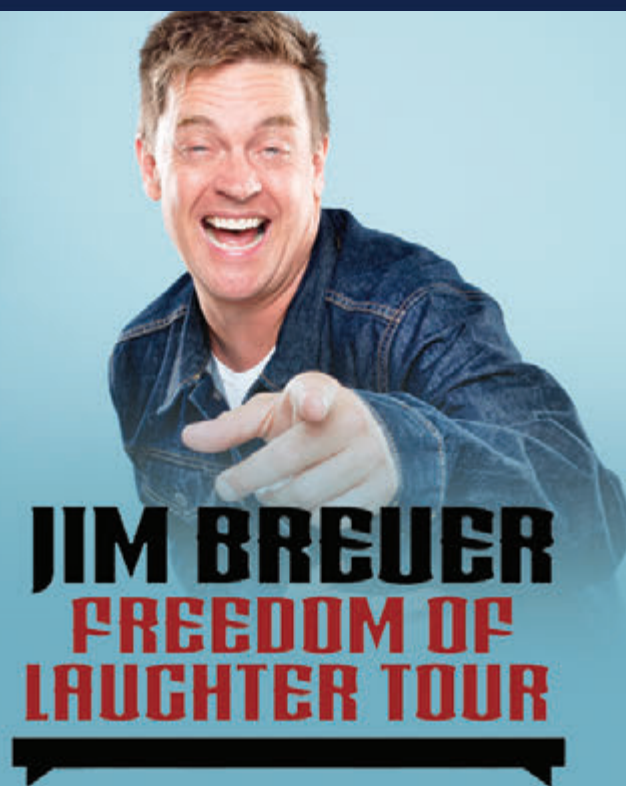

Covington Plaza gets artistic with fair

National, regional artists will be at annual juried show

The wait is nearly over for local art enthusiasts.

On June 25-26, the Covington Art Fair returns to Covington Plaza, drawing fans and artists from far and wide.

"We have a good amount of local artists, which I mean from Fort Wayne, Spencerville, and Ossian," coordinator Glenda Stoppenhagen said. "But we also have some of Ohio and Michigan, as well as some coming from California, Florida, and Oklahoma. It really is regional and national."

Along with a mailing list, Stoppenhagen credits the artists who attend the fair with getting the word out.

"Artists are a close-knit group, so if one has a good experience, they might tell another," she said. "We've been around 30 years, so we have a bit of notoriety."

A LOT TO LIKE

According to Stoppenhagen, the art fair began 30 years ago as a way to attract more customers to the plaza. Owned by local company Bobeck Real

Estate at the time, the fair served its purpose and has continued with strong support, even after the plaza was sold to national companies.

"The tenants have been fully on board," Stoppenhagen said of shop owners at the plaza.

Artists have also been on board.

"They like that it's in a parking lot, because they can just drive up and set up," Stoppenhagen said. "It's all about ease."

Artists might be able set up with ease, but the same can't be said for getting invited to the show. To get into the juried show, artists must submit photos of their work and booth, which is then judged by a panel.

"It's upper-tier art," Stoppenhagen said.

SLIGHT CHANGES

Although the art fair has been around 30 years, that doesn't mean it's remained static. Stoppenhagen said the only "hiccup" during that time was its cancellation in 2020 due to the pandemic. Then, it was pushed back a couple months in 2021, with a minor adjustment made this year.

"It used to always be weekend of Father's Day, but I always thought, 'Most dads don't want to be dragged to an art show,'" Stoppenhagen said. "In 2021, things were still iffy with the pandemic, and there were five weeks in August, so

that made it easier for artists to join."

Now held the week after Father's Day, the only unknown will be the weather.

"It really is hit and miss," Stoppenhagen said. "It could be mild, in the 60s-70s, or like it is now, but people come no matter what. Fort Wayne has a very loyal following."

Along with a large variety of artwork to peruse, such as acrylic, watercolor, woodworking, glass, pottery, jewelry, and more, attendees will enjoy some jazz music, food trucks, and the popular kettle corn.

Providing the jazz music Saturday will be Chris Rutkowski, Michael Patterson, and Rich Cohen from 10 a.m.-noon; Kevin Piekarski, Jerry Farington, Steve Smeltzer, Rick Brown, and Scott Allen from 12:30-2:30 p.m.; and Walter Brath, Michael Patterson, and John Weber from 3-5 p.m. On Sunday, Dave Latchaw, Kevin Piekarski, and John Kaplanis will perform from 12:30-2:30 p.m.

The art fair runs from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. on Saturday, June 25, and 11 a.m.-4 p.m. on Sunday, June 26.

Admission is \$5 per person or \$15 per family, with proceeds going to Kentuckiana Pug Rescue.

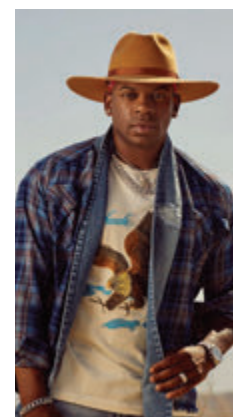

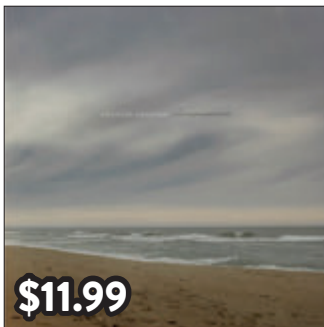

The Murmurations is a band that consists of Tyler Damerell (lead guitar/backing vocals), Jamie Drake (lead vocals/rhythm guitar), and Sean Woodridge (drums/backing vocals). On their new album *Kids*, the Fort Wayne trio wanted to record an "homage to adolescence and rock n' roll the way it used to be." I'm not about looking back, really. Someone once said, "It's the same as it ever was," and I think no matter the decade, rock n' roll remains the same, just different faces and a few different chord changes.

But The Murmurations are bound and determined to give us a rock album we didn't know we needed. Waxing ecstatic about adolescence, writing pop rock tracks that are equal parts big riffs and big melodies, and not shying away from earnest ballads, *Kids* is a love letter to the feels we had growing up, cranking the boom box to ten. The tracks aspire to be arena anthems, so get that lighter out and put your hand in the air.

What do you get on *Kids*? Well, the 14 tracks span from chugging arena rock to ballads and everything in-between that played on both classic rock and alternative radio in the '90s. From the tip of the hat to Foreigner with album opener "Boombox Heroes," to the nostalgia-laden rock ballad "Bumblebee Girl," to the crunchy pop punk of "Drive In," this Fort Wayne trio wants to take you on a radio dial tour of pop rock's past.

The album as a whole feels like a nostalgia trip, from track titles like "Less Than Zero," "Truth or Dare," "We Ruled The World," and "Polaroid Pictures," to the mixtape album cover and power chord crunch, we're taken on a trip back to where singer Jamie Drake finds his comfort zone. That comfort zone sounds like the late '80s and early '90s: touches of The Smithereens, Soul Asylum, and even *Monster*-era R.E.M. (especially on "Best Friends").

If you grew up pre-CD burner and remember making mixtapes in a cassette deck, or sat patiently through hours of terrible videos on MTV to dub just one, then you'll find something to dig on The Murmurations' *Kids*. If not, you may still be surprised. — J. Hubner

Star Halos



With more than 100 million albums sold, it is with great anticipation that we finally get to listen to the newest offering from Def Leppard, *Diamond Star Halos*. Unfortunately, it's not up to par with what we expect from the legendary rockers.

The album kicks off in fine fashion with "Take What You Want," a song that could easily become

a staple in live sets immediately. With an above average chorus and some great support from guitarists Phil Collen and Vivian Campbell, this is a great leadoff to the album. It is one of the few highpoints, though.

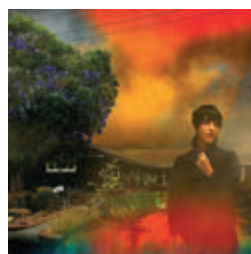
"Kick," the first single from the album, is next. It's a bit "bubble gummy" and is a curious choice for a single when the third offering, "Fire It Up," would have represented the band better.

But wait. Who do we hear on "This Guitar"? Is that Allison Krauss singing with Joe Elliott? It is. While Krauss has legitimate rock ties from her work with Robert Plant, she seems out of place with these British rock vets. But Def Leppard double down when Krauss also appears later in the disc on "Lifeless," which is also the description of the song. Of the rest of the 15 songs served up on *Diamond Star Halos*, only "SOS Emergency" and "Liquid Dust" are worth the trouble among a mix of '70s-influenced material that is mediocre at best and a waste of time at worst.

To be fair, we can't expect Def Leppard to replicate the success the band had in the '80s with *Hysteria* and *Pyromania*, but would it be too much to ask that they reach for the low bar *Adrenalize* and *Euphoria* set? If you're looking for an album that reminds you of this band's best years, this isn't it. If you're looking for songs with big production and big hooks, the kind Def Leppard have made a career writing, you won't find them here. This homage to their own rock heroes has knocked them off course, causing Def Leppard to deliver one of the most disappointing albums of the year. — Chris Hupe

We've Been Going
About This All
Wrong



Sharon Van Etten has made a steady climb to premier American songwriter ever since her debut, 2009's *Because I Was in Love*. Dark pop complimented by layered harmonies, personal lyrics, and a dramatic feel that everything hangs in the balance, Van Etten has taken that intimacy and built it into a solid career.

In 2020, Van Etten released a song with Angel Olsen called "Like I Used To," a big, full-throated pop rock track that had the grandeur of '80s Stevie Nicks and Chrissie Hynde collaborating. It felt like a next level move for both artists, and Sharon Van Etten's new album *We've Been Going About This All Wrong* lives up to that track's promise.

Ten tracks and just under 40 minutes, *We've Been Going About This All Wrong* is a lush, more layered record than 2019's *Remind Me Tomorrow*.

Produced at her home studio and without producer John Congleton (who produced her last LP), this record feels like an artist putting their all into the songs, making a record that reflects the world around them, for better or worse.

Opening track "Darkness Fades" opens with acoustic guitar and Van Etten's voice, which builds into a crescendo of percussion, drones,

Asbury Park is a small town on the Jersey Shore. It's a seaside community that claims Danny DeVito, Bud Abbott, and the Morro Castle disaster. But it was a little club called Mrs. Jay's that put Asbury Park on the (rock n' roll) map, when a 23-year-old kid named Bruce Springsteen began to play there. The Boss grew up a few miles north and decided to name his first album after the town that gave him his start.

The record opens with "Blinded by the Light," a song made popular when covered by Manfred Mann in the winter of 1977. The Springsteen version ironically never charted.

"Growin' Up" follows and is an imposing track about adolescence and coming of age in the late 1960s. It's still one of my favorite Bruce songs. The album slows down a little with "Mary Queen of Arkansas." It's one of those Dylan-country tracks that made critics appreciate The Boss. It put him in the same conversation as Bob Dylan.

"Lost in the Flood" is about a Vietnam vet, a cause that Springsteen still fights for decades later. "For You," also covered by Mann (and Greg Kihn), was one of those tracks that Springsteen started off slow and finished strong. Lyrically, Dylan could have written it himself. "Spirits in the Night," a jazzy-rock number, featured Clarence "The Big Man" Clemons and his immense saxophone. — Dennis Donahue

and an almost apocalyptic feel. This is pop music for end of the world.

"Home to Me" is piano, an electronic beat, and of course that unmistakable voice. "Born" is sad and gorgeous with lyrics like "I knew where I was born/I knew where I was blamed by the world," which builds to a grandiose finale. "Headspace" is all industrial noise and attitude, like Pat Benatar produced by Trent Reznor.

Sharon Van Etten is bringing back the kind of bombastic pop song that we haven't heard since the '80s. Hits written by one person, produced by one person, and performed by a band. It doesn't really work that way anymore. It's now an army of songwriters, producers, and PR people building a star out of a tween with 1.2 million followers on Youtube or Tik Tok. *We've Been Going About This All Wrong* sounds like a step in the right direction. Now, we just need to get the rest of the world on board. Shouldn't be hard, right? — J. Hubner

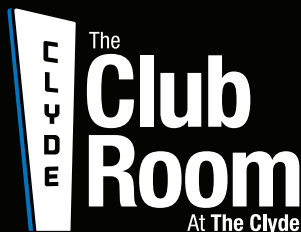

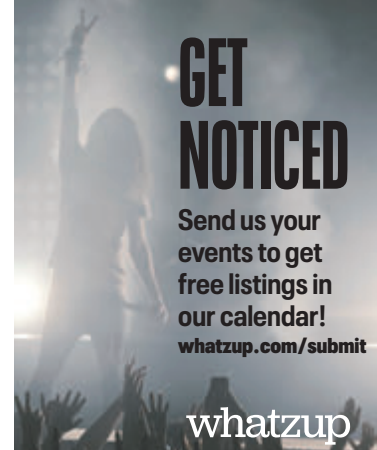

I've been rewatching P.T. Anderson's *Licorice Pizza* and Wes Anderson's *The French Dispatch* a lot lately. They're so, so, so good. As much as I just want to talk about those two films, this week we're talking about the best films from the first half of 2022.

7. *The Northman* (Robert Eggers) — Any time an art-house filmmaker gets a major Hollywood budget and final cut, I'm in. This one doesn't work as well as I had hoped, but it's very much worth seeing. Beautifully produced and directed.

6. *Fresh* (Mimi Cave) — Wow. This one caught me by surprise. Sure, it's a comment on gender and features incredible performances. Sure, it's beautifully shot. Mostly, what I see in this one is a new vision from a director I was unfamiliar with, Mimi Cave. The third act falls extremely short, but this one is still very much

worth checking out. Sebastian Stan is a beast.

5. *Hustle* (Jeremiah Zagar) — I like basketball. I love basketball. So does Adam Sandler, who leads this fun, funny, breezy film. Also, this is the best scripted basketball film since *Blue Chips*. Don't expect a standard Sandler comedy with this one.

4. *Cow* (Andrea Arnold) — A documentary that shows more than it tells. Imagine that. Andrea Arnold is sneakily one of the best filmmakers of the last 15 or so years, and this is another brilliant chapter in her journey. Don't be surprised if this one is nominated for Best Documentary at the Oscars. It might even win.

3. *The Batman* (Matt Reeves) — I did not expect to like this movie. In fact, like many, I thought I'd hate it. I'm completely burned out on this whole superhero era for films, but the Bat is my favorite, and I believe in Robert Pattinson. So here we have a moody, mumbly Batman. The film is flawed, but is also a style fest that I ultimately think is one of the most interesting *Batman* films yet.

2. *Top Gun: Maverick* (Joesph Kosinski) — This one might change the movies a bit. All those folks who only go to the theater for Marvel releases went out and saw this, and were reminded that, guess what, not everything has to be fantasy. Not all heroes wear spandex and can do magic. An amazing time at the movies.

1. *Everything Everywhere All at Once* (Dan Kwan, Daniel Scheinert) — I don't want to say anything about this one. If you've seen it, you know. If you haven't seen it, I think you should. And don't read anything about it before you watch it.

Haven't seen yet but have high hopes for: *Crimes of the Future* (David Cronenberg), *After Yang* (Kogonada), and many, many more.

Here's the thing: There's seemingly an infinite number of films coming out these days, and it feels more impossible than ever to have an informed opinion when making best-of lists. So, ya know, take this for what it is. Only two of those films feel like they might be on the level of *The French Dispatch* and *Licorice Pizza*. That being said, I clearly have a lot more to see.

Pixar makes use of tried, true formula

After two long years of having their premieres relegated to direct-to-Disney+ release, Pixar is finally back in theaters. While their latest effort *Lightyear* doesn't match the quality of the outstanding trio of films (*Soul*, *Luca*, *Turning Red*) that were launched on the streaming service, it's a fun and familiar spin-off that will reacquaint theatergoers with the studio's magic.

Fans of *Toy Story* may be confused as to why Tim Allen, who voiced the toy Buzz Lightyear, hasn't returned for this entry. The reason is that this new movie is meant to act as the movie that actually inspired the Buzz toy within this universe, a sort of "origin story" for the new action figure Andy got all those years ago. Admittedly, it's a confusing and strained framing device, but once *Lightyear* takes off, it doesn't matter much anyway.

Chris Evans voices this version of Buzz Lightyear, a headstrong Star Command Space Ranger whose job is to explore new planets across the galaxy. After one such expedition goes haywire, Buzz attempts to escape with his crew of 1,200 in tow but accidentally damages their ship in the process. Many years pass as Buzz completes trial runs with hyperspace fuel to get his stranded crew off the planet, but by the time he's successful, they've developed a livable colony and most don't want to leave. Buzz recruits a small group of outsiders, including Izzy (Keke Palmer), Mo (Taika Waititi), and Darby (Dale Soules), to help him get the necessary materials to get the ship travel-ready again, but Emperor Zurg (James Brolin) and his invading robot army have other plans in mind.

Though *Lightyear* borrows liberally from sci-fi touchstones like *Star Trek* and *Interstellar*, the rhythm of its narrative follows the familiar structure of many animated adventure films, where obstacles crop up and our protagonists have to think up a way around them. Buzz wants to be a lone ranger, so to speak, but along the way, he'll learn the value of companionship and teamwork.

Visually, the movie doesn't always break new ground either. Buzz's attempts to break into hyperspace will no doubt remind audiences of the Darkstar scene from the recently released *Top Gun: Maverick*. But there are some choices with chronology and story that do break the mold, like a montage of the time that flies away from Buzz during his hyperspace runs that echoes the "Married Life" sequence from *Up*.

There's also a "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" ethic to certain creative choices, too, like the inclusion of a robot "therapy cat" named Sox to help Buzz during his

quest. The animated genre is saturated with animal friends that help human heroes in their journey, and while Sox isn't entirely unique in its conception, the character completely works in this setting and practically scampers away with the whole movie. Voiced by Peter Sohn, who played Emile in *Ratatouille* and various smaller characters in other Pixar films, Sox has a humble and helpful timbre that seemed to channel Tom Hanks' most genial and gentle work. Plenty of laughs are derived from the juxtaposition of Sox's ability to make advanced calculations and hack into computer systems with his proclivities toward feline behavior, like wanting belly scratches and chasing laser beams.

Sequels and spinoffs are my least favorite sub-genre of Pixar movies, and while *Lightyear* certainly isn't as banal as the *Cars* follow-ups or *Monsters University*, it's not up to the level of the three *Toy Story* sequels, either.

The screenplay by Jason Headley and director Angus MacLane relies too heavily on action-adventure tropes, while having to rope in *Toy Story* lore and Pixar pathos along the way. Not every Pixar movie has to reach for the profundity of their most meaningful work, but their more escapist efforts should at least strive for a sort of cinematic equivalent. Perhaps it didn't help that the theater in which I saw this film had pretty wimpy sound; the dialogue was audible, but the surround sound didn't kick in for impact during the action scenes.

Despite the pedestrian story, I will likely give *Lightyear* another chance on my home theater system.

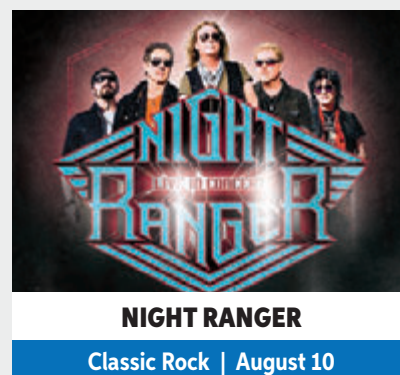
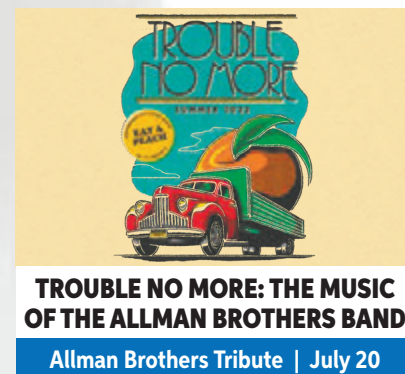
