

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Barenaked Ladies find their footing

Departure not slowing Canadian Hall of Famers; visiting Embassy on Oct. 2

Back in 2018, Barenaked Ladies got one of the highest honors a Canadian music act can receive when they were inducted into the Canadian Music Hall of Fame.

For the occasion, the current four-man lineup of lead singer/guitarist Ed Robertson, drummer Tyler Stewart, bassist Jim Creeggan, and keyboardist/guitarist Kevin Hearn reunited with singer/guitarist Steven Page, who left the band in 2009 to pursue a solo career, a split that according to most accounts involved some tension.

Media coverage of the induction featured plenty of speculation over whether the reunion would result in emotional fireworks, or would possibly lead to a lasting reunion with Page, who along with Robertson, wrote the bulk of the songs that made Barenaked Ladies the biggest band in Canada during the 1990s, when early singles like "If I Had \$1,000,000" and "Jane" blew up in Canada, and later on "It's All Been Done," "One Week" and "Pinch Me" became global hits.

That sort of coverage missed the point, according to Stewart.

"Ultimately it was beautiful because to be recognized by your peers and by the Canadian music establishment as hall-of-fame worthy was really incredible," he said. "But yeah, there was definitely lots of focus on the fact that after 11 years or whatever it was, we were getting back together with Steven. But ultimately, that was really easy. On a personal level, we just got together and rehearsed the songs and laughed and talked about our kids, kind of like we used to do. Instead of playing music, we snacked and told jokes. That's sort of how it went. And that was great. I think the media were expecting something different and certainly tried to push a narrative of, 'Hey, they're getting back together.' And it's like actually, both parties have no real intention of that. I think both sides are quite happy with where things are at."

Four years later, Page continues to build his solo career. And the four-piece edition of Barenaked Ladies seems more established than ever, and will visit Embassy Theatre on Sunday, Oct. 2.

MOVING FULL STEAM AHEAD

Proceeding without Page, Barenaked Ladies released *Detour de Force* in 2021, then a deluxe edition in June.

The 14-song album is the most musically ambitious, wide-ranging album in the band's 16-album catalog. It includes four songs written by Hearn and two Creeggan co-writes to go with Robertson's songs. The music ranges from the hooky rock-pop of "Flip," "Good Life," and "New Disaster" to warm pop ballads like "God Forbid,"

"Live Well," and "The National Park" to the lively horn-infused rocker "Roll Out" and a multifaceted five-minute-plus opus, "Internal Dynamo."

Ironically, the band started the project expecting to make a more modest, largely acoustic, and live-in-the-studio album, and in early 2020, gathered at Robertson's cabin in Northern Ontario with producer Mark Howard to record that very album.

FINDING THEIR VOICE

The four musicians emerged in March 2020 with a dozen or so songs and feeling great about the band's internal chemistry.

"I think if anything, we confirmed the magic that has been percolating ever since we became a four-piece," Stewart said of the cottage session. "I think one of the great things is now each band member kind of gets to utilize more space. We all get more space to be ourselves within the group. So, whether that means bringing songs in and singing lead on them, or singing different parts or helping arranging in different sessions or co-writes, whatever, I think each guy does a lot more now than when we were a five piece. That continues to grow. That continues to evolve, and we continue to broaden everybody's involvement." But the four band members also felt they didn't have a finished album.

"We kind of were thinking you know what, we'd like to maybe beef some of these (songs) up," Stewart said. "There were a couple of songs we didn't record, which were more kind of production numbers, songs like 'Flip' and 'Good Life,' things like that. So we decided to go back into the studio in Toronto.

"We kind of married the two (sessions)," the drummer said. "We got the acoustic off-the-floor, intimate sessions mixed with the bigger, shinier, full studio production. So there you go, the album is 'Detour de Force,' but we had to take a detour to get it there."

GOING LIVE

Now, Barenaked Ladies are back to playing live, having brought their "Last Summer on Earth" tour to the states over the summer with the Gin Blossoms and Toad the Wet Sprocket as opening acts.

They are now headlining shows for the fall, and Stewart said he and his bandmates are getting creative with the set lists.

"You're going to see a very varied set," he said. "You're going to see some departures musically. You're going to see some different guys singing lead vocals, taking over. We're going to try to vary the set as much as we can. We kind of made a commitment as well to do some acoustic (versions) and to not limit ourselves in any way. Even if it's an electric song, we'll break it down to its simplest element and play it acoustically."

Calder the Band nearly has new album in hand

Following more than year of work, Shape Up set to stream Oct. 7

No one can accuse Calder the Band of rushing to complete their second album.

Due to a pandemic and its five members being scattered across the country, the band says its upcoming release, Shape Up, has been about a year and a half in the making.

"I did not expect this album to take as long as it did," electric guitarist Luke Matulis said.

According to acoustic guitarist John Michael Sellers, the amount of time to produce the album, due to hit streaming services Oct. 7, wasn't only about getting the members together, but also getting the sound together.

"We just kind of hashed each one out until we felt it was right," he said. "That could really only be achieved if we were in the same room. That's what really took so long, and why it probably took a solid year-and-a-half."

But now that they have it together, they're happy those who have waited four years for a new album have hung in there.

"We have a great fanbase that cares about us and wants to hear our music," vocalist/keyboardist Joe Stilwell said. "I think the hype is somewhat there for the album to drop."

PAINSTAKING PROCESS

Calder the Band began with Stilwell, bassist Lee Cliff, and Matulis, releasing their first album, Till I Get It Right, in 2018. Following Matulis' move back to his hometown of Chicago, Stilwell and Cliff released their He'll Come Around EP in 2020.

Now, with Matulis back in the fold, and Lee's brother, drummer Aaron Cliff, and Sellers in the mix, the five guys that met at a New York Bible school are working as a unit.

"If one of us was taken away, it wouldn't sound the same," Stilwell said. "That was our

goal with the album. It just required a lot of work upfront. It did drive us loony a few times, I'll admit, because it felt like we weren't making progress, but we were. We were just trying to find our sound with five voices."

The five would chisel out weekends to work out demos, but many times the recording wouldn't be completed in the time frame, even when it seemed like a song would come together with ease.

"The song '3rdStreet,' that must have been the first week we came together, that song came so naturally, we must have had it done in a day, but it must have taken a solid year to record it the way we wanted it to sound," Lee Cliff said. "We could not get the sound we wanted. We recorded it three or four different ways, spending a year on it, and I was so sick of that song by the end."

In the end, it was his brother that kept pushing for a more live sound, with some of

the recordings taking place with all five playing at same time, which was something new for the band.

"The biggest thing was that we wrote the songs live, a lot of them came out of jams, so we wanted the songs to have those feelings that we had when we were writing them," Lee Cliff said.

REMOTE ACCESS

Once they felt the songs were in a good place, they ship them to Matulis in Chicago, where he'd add his guitar and put some finishing touches on them, which was something new for him.

"I am not a trained mixer, so I would spend a lot of time making a lot of mistakes, then going back to figure out what I had messed up," Matulis said.

Along with Matulis in Chicago, Sellers was in New York, so time was of the essence when they could get into the same room. But that also meant gigs had to be put on the backburner.

"It's taken a Herculean effort to finish this album," Stilwell said. "I think if we had even thought about booking, this album would not be coming out in October, it'd be coming out even later. That's our main focus."

MAKING VOICES HEARD

And that effort began in the spring of 2021.

"I'd say that working on our song 'Faulty Upfront' in 2021 is the first time that we felt like we had something we could build off of," Matulis said. "That was kind of how we started working more on live practices and sort of building on our demos that we had."

With things coming together, Calder the Band released the first single from Shape Up, "Dandelion," on March 25. "Indiana Sky," which was actually written by New York's Sellers, was released June 27. The process of releasing singles nearly became the theme of the album.

"All of us really appreciate deep, thematic records with a lot of undercurrents," Stilwell said. "This record, we were looking at it very much like individual songs, which was also a challenge for us. When we were thinking about marketing strategies, we were even thinking about stringing the album out across many months and release each song as a single. When people hear this record, there are quite a few sounds and quite a few ideas going. A lot of that comes from, 'We're going to be an album together like 10 singles, standalone songs."

And with so many "standalone songs," each member of the group gets a say on the record.

"We were very intentional to make everyone's individual voice heard, so it becomes even hard to pinpoint any individual inspiration for each track," Aaron Cliff said.

And all those voices will be heard when Shape Up makes its way to streaming services, with possible physical copies in the future.

"I feel like we're nearing the end of the marathon," Stilwell said.

Ambitious season on horizon for Philharmonic, conductor

Firebird kicks off season Oct. 8 at Embassy Theatre

Musical director Andrew Constantine and the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra are launching their 2022-23 season, their most ambitious yet.

The season kicks off Oct. 8 with *Firebird* at Embassy Theatre at 7:30 p.m., as well as a 2 p.m. performance as part of the new Matinee Series.

The Pops Series will feature five productions and four chamber concerts featuring famous women composers. The Phil is also debuting the Stories in Music Series based on children's books with three concerts, and, in April, they will present their Bach in the Barn production.

MAIN EVENTS: THE MASTERWORKS CONCERTS

Whatzup sat down with Constantine to talk about the main events, their seven Masterworks concerts at Embassy Theatre.

The British conductor made a name for himself in St. Petersburg, Russia, and England. These days, he is conductor not only for the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, but also the Reading Symphony Orchestra in Pennsylvania. He conducts orchestras all over the U.S. and Europe and specializes across a broad range: works of living American composers, classic British and Russian composers, and orchestral music of Broadway, too.

With the support of patrons, the Philharmonic continues to fly in some of the finest soloists from around the world to perform with Constantine. We'll list each concert, followed by comments from the maestro.

Opening Night: Firebird, Oct. 8 — Verdi's overture to the opera La forza del destino; "Autumn" from The Seasons by Glazunov; Stravinsky's suite from his ballet The Firebird; Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto in D major, featuring Paul Huang

According to Constantine, the theme is "the force of destiny, fate. The Verdi actually was premiered in St. Petersburg. Glazunov, Stravinsky and Tchaikovsky were all products of late 19th century Russia, and fate dealt them very different hands."

Tchaikovsky's violin concerto is among the most famous of musical fireworks displays. "Paul Huang is a phenomenal violinist that I love working with."

Carmina Burana, Oct. 29 — Bernstein's Three Dance Episodes from his musical On the Town; the world premiere of Patrick O'Malley's Concerto for Viola featuring Brett Deubner; Orff's Carmina Burana, with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Chorus, the Purdue Fort Wayne University Singers, and the Fort Wayne Children's Choir

"O'Malley is a young man who was raised in Fort Wayne and is enjoying a very successful career. Brett Deubner is the most enterprising viola player I've ever come across. *Carmina Burana* is something that never fails to take the roof off, something

that audiences love."

As for the three choirs, "They've all been champing at the bit to sing. The pandemic has been pretty disastrous in terms of the effect it's had on the chorus and their capacity to perform."

It's the perfect opportunity for the Philharmonic to encourage choral music in Fort Wayne.

Power and Passion, Jan. 28 — Higdon's Concerto for Orchestra; Rachmaninoff's Concerto No. 3, Yefim Bronfman, piano

Jennifer Higdon "is the most-performed living composer in the world. It's an incredibly energetic work. It's something the orchestra hasn't played before, and it's great to bring new material to them, to excite them, to enthuse them. Particularly when you're contrasting it with something as familiar as Rachmaninov's musical language."

Bronfman is among the most in-demand pianists in the world. "I've never worked with him. That's something I'm really looking forward to."

Conductor's Choice: Elgar and Beethoven, Feb. 18 — Elgar's Falstaff; Beethoven's Concerto in D major, Op. 61, Vadim Gluzman, violin To Constantine, Elgar is the

"greatest composer who ever lived. *Falstaff* was his finest piece. It's phenomenally difficult to play."

It's a tone poem about the character from William Shakespeare's *Henry* plays. Constantine puts his mark on it by bringing in actors to read Shakespeare's lines between the movements. Ending on a quiet note, it's paired with the rousing, soaring Beethoven.

"And then we have the phenomenal Vadim Gluzman, with many people's favorite violin concerto."

This Midnight Hour, March 11 — Ravel's Concerto in G major, Orli Shaham, piano; Anna Clyne's This Midnight Hour; Copland's Symphony No. 3; guest conductor James Judd

"First is this magnificent piece by Anna Clyne," from 2015. "Then the wonderful Orli Shaham on piano, and Copland's third symphony, which is something I don't think the orchestra has performed before. It's colossal. There's a grand reworking of the 'Fanfare for the Common Man' in there, which I find much more interesting than the isolated 'Fanfare' we all know."

Violins and Bandoneons: Latin Themes with guest conductor James Judd, April 1 — Ginastera's Four Dances from Estancia, with the Fort Wayne Ballet; JP Jofre's Double Concerto for Violin and Bandoneon No.2, with Violetta Todorova, violin and JP Jofre, bandoneon; Piazzolla's Aconcagua: Concerto for Bandoneon; De Falla's Suite No. 2 from El sombrero de tres picos "Diversity and showing that the orchestra can be presented with musical language that represents folklore of different countries. We have the ballet excerpt at the beginning and the end."

Argentinian composer Jofre "is such a phenomenal player, and he gives an opportunity as well for our wonderful concertmaster Violetta to shine. Everybody likes a good tango. Everybody loves Piazzolla. James Judd is a marvelous conductor, and he's worked with the greatest orchestras in the world, the Berlin Philharmonic, the Amsterdam Concertgebouw."

Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, May 13 — Prokofiev's Symphony No. 6; Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, Ilya Yakushev, piano; Gershwin's An American in Paris

"It's full circle here," Constantine said. "Prokofiev, trained in St. Petersburg," left the U.S. in 1936 and "went back to Russia, made the big mistake. The symphony is not very long. It's delicate and does not have a rousing ending. But I don't want to leave anybody feeling less than energized when they leave the hall. And there's nothing more energetic than An American in Paris. I've conducted it a number of times and everyone just goes crazy at the end of it. Ilya Yakushev is a friend of the orchestra. It's a magnificent piece to close the season with."



Nostalgia served up at Hall's Drive-In

here aren't many places that define Fort Wayne like the Hall's Family of Restaurants. They've been around only since the 1940s. It was, and is, consistent

As national chains and more prominent local eateries have come and gone. Hall's restaurants have been as steady as the tortoise in the fabled race with the hare. They are blue-collar, meat-and-potato meals. You

know what you're going to get, and its genius in its simplicity. They've also excelled at their specialty restaurants, The Factory and Takaoka of Japan.

Last week. I visited an old friend I haven't visited since the pandemic. That friend? Hall's Hollywood Drive-In at the corner of Coliseum Boulevard and Lima Road.

While my daughter was at a school skating event at Roller Dome North, I needed to kill an hour, and there was Hall's calling next door. I willingly answered and pulled up.

Eaten Path DEAN JACKSON

Tucked away on the east side of the building is the drive-in. There's daily specials printed in a monthly calendar format, just like it was when I ate there as a kid. The only thing different is this crazy thing called a QR code that I scanned from my phone. The QR code, which I'm not a huge fan of generally speaking, is the modern day equivalent of the Dick Tracy Decoder Ring: Typically it comes off as a way to be cool, but really adds another hoop to leap through for the customer.

Guess what, though? In this case, it was a perfect execution of the technology.

I placed my order and clicked my headlights on, probably the way my parents did in the 1950s. The server came. A few minutes later, they clipped the tray to the car door. Like so many times before, the food came. I still was as transfixed as I was years ago

Again, no splash. No flash. The sizzle came in the Big Buster, the same as I've gotten at least a billion times, a triple-decker cheeseburger with lettuce and special sauce.

I ate quietly, enjoying the simple, dumb pleasure of a drive-in dinner behind the wheel. When I was done I flipped the lights again to signal the server to return.

Moments later, I hustled over to the rink and waited for my daughter, proud of myself as I explained that I went old school. She looked at me like I was an alien with three heads and said, "Why don't you just go to the drive thru?"

"Tradition," I said. "You'll have yours, too." I saw her roll her eyes from the corner of my eye.

Michigan band playing songs from new album at Clyde Theatre show

Detroit area rockers I Prevail have solidified themselves as a top-tier metal band with the recent release of their third full-length album, *True Power*.

Unique, powerful, and innovative, they will bring their energetic live show to The Clyde Theatre in Fort Wayne on Oct. 7 with special guests Pierce the Veil, Fit for a King, and Yours Truly.

SOLIDIFYING METAL STATUS

The band's 2019 album *Trauma* garnered two Grammy nominations for Best Rock Album and Best Metal Performance for "Bow Down," and thrust I Prevail onto the short list of elite "up and coming" metal bands.

Their followup album, *True Power*, released in August, shows that *Trauma* wasn't a fluke. It is packed with consistent, quality songs that break down many barriers of the hard rock and metal genres, allowing them to shed that "up and coming" qualifier. It's clear they should now simply be known as one of today's top metal bands.

With 15 tracks, *True Power*, has a lot to offer, from the nu-metal influenced "Fake" to the melodic "Closure," and the raucous, headbanging "Body Bag." For good measure, you can even hear a beautiful piano piece in closer "Doomed."

It could be said that *True Power* simply continues the journey that began with *Trauma* since the album doesn't show a drastic change in sound or approach, but there's no doubt there is an evolution. The band sounds more cohesive, more driven, and more in sync, with a seemingly common mission of producing aggressive music that also has soul.

"As much as this is a rock and a metal record, I feel like this is our heaviest record

to date," singer Brian Burkheiser told *Upset Magazine* in an August interview. "It still does have a very, very diverse soundtrack."

VENTURING INTO NEW TERRITORY

The band have become known for their heartfelt lyrics, which may seem like a dichotomy given the aggressive nature of most of their music, but I Prevail make it work while forging ahead into new territory. With subjects like mental health, relationships, and even the pressure of putting out a new and similarly successful album are subjects the band approach.

"We've never really done anything like this before," Burkheiser said. "*Trauma* was the first record I felt like we were able to take ourselves and really just be that core, small group and put it together."

While that album was a huge success, it also raised expectations for the band, and many wondered if they could replicate the formula.

"I think coming out of *Trauma*, there was a side kind of pressure, just having the Grammy stuff and things like that floating around in the back of your mind," guitarist Steve Menoian admitted to *Billboard*. "But weirdly, for me, this was pretty much the most confident I felt making a record, even in how much the stakes had been raised and everything that we've got to try to live up to. Even through the ups and downs, and how long it took us to make it, I always felt very confident."

The extra time granted during the pandemic helped them produce exactly what they wanted and allowed them to try out new ideas and out-of-the-box concepts. Basically, they had time to breathe.

"This is a record I'll look back on and just think how fun it was to be so creative and have so many different aspects to it," Burkheiser said.

GETTING BACK ON ROAD

Getting back on tour and supporting *True Power*'s release was something the band really looked forward to since the feeling of bringing the music to the people energizes them in a way nothing else can. Outside of a few festival appearances and a short Australian tour, I Prevail hadn't been on the road regularly since the start of the pandemic in 2019.

Kicking off Sept. 9 in Las Vegas, the True Power Tour has been well-received.

"I am so excited," Burkheiser said. "We've been waiting so long. Australia was incredible, to be like, 'OK, we're on tour.' We actually had a set of seven shows in 10 days, or whatnot. It was so good just to do that little stretch, but we were so, so, so excited to come back to America. With this new record leaning into the heavier side. These crowds are going to be crazy. We can't wait."

That road appears to have been paved with gold since I Prevail exploded onto the scene in late 2013 with an adrenalized cover of Taylor Swift's "Blank Space," a song that became a viral sensation that hit No. 90 on the Billboard 100 before going platinum.

Despite critical acclaim, chart success, and a fast-growing, rabid fan base that devours everything the band does, I Prevail still see themselves as a work in progress, not yet fulfilling the potential they know they possess. According to Burkheiser, that's what drives them to keep forging ahead, never resting on their laurels.

"We've got a mission to try to continue progressing the genre forward," Burkheiser said.

Brickman making stop in town

Sweetwater on songwriter's Across America tour, where audiences get to sing along

Two-time Grammy nominated songwriter Jim Brickman is bringing his Brickman Across America Tour to Fort Wayne.

On Saturday, Oct. 8, the famed storyteller and pianist will perform in the Sweetwater Performance Theatre, with it being recorded live as part of a compilation album.

"Most of the time, I tour around Christmastime, and I just thought, 'Wouldn't it be great to be able to do something that's a little bit different,' Brickman told *Whatzup* about the tour, which begins Oct. 6 at City Winery in Chicago. "I've always loved traveling, and I've always been influenced as a songwriter by great American composers and the influences of early American music. I thought, 'Wouldn't it be cool to stop around the country, at iconic venues, and at places where I could celebrate American music.' That's what we're doing."

SHOWING KNACK FOR PIANO

Born in the Cleveland suburb of Shaker Heights, Ohio, Brickman's parents introduced him to piano at the age of 5, but, according to his bio, he butted heads with his piano teacher, who said he "didn't have a knack for it."

"When you're a songwriter, technique is not really your forte," Brickman said. "Your forte is: the music is going around in your head and you play it by ear. You're drawn to music, but not technically proficient.

"Songwriting isn't something you know when you're 5, 10 years old," he added. "So, people don't understand that, and the teacher is like, 'He won't play the notes on the page,' but they don't think of why."

Proving he did have "a knack for it," Brickman went on to attend the Cleveland Institute of Music and began a career as a jingle writer for commercials for the likes of Diet Coke, Cheerios, and General Electric.

"I loved doing it," he said. "It wasn't something where I was like, 'I'm only doing this to get somewhere else.' It was my career."

However, the shine eventually wore off, and Brickman wanted to try something new.

"I felt like I had accomplished what I set out to do, and it wasn't as enjoyable as it was at the start," he said. "I thought, 'I'm going to move to California and just explore.' Maybe I could be a studio musician, write songs for movies, I didn't know exactly what I was after. It was more that I just wanted to see what was out there.

"I did a lot of recording and still did some jingles for clients, but I felt like once I started to play more, I had a style that was unique and it was something people could use to relax," he added. "It was instrumental music that could be popular because it mainstream, it wasn't imperial or jazz. It was pop music, only instrumental."

RACKING UP ACCOLADES

In 1994, Brickman released his first album, *No Words*, which reached No. 13 on the New Age chart. Following that, things really began to heat up as 1995's *By Heart* went gold, reaching No. 3 on the chart, followed by two

straight gold albums in 1997 that hit No. 1, $Picture\ This$ and $The\ Gift.$

In all, Brickman has four gold albums and 22 that have topped the New Age chart. His 2003 album *Peace* garnered a Grammy nomination for Best Pop Instrumental Album and 2008's *Faith* was nominated for Best New Age Album.

Despite the accolades, it's the experiences that have left the biggest impression on Brickman.

"Whenever you work with people you admire, that's always a highlight," he said. "Working with Carly Simon, Olivia Newton-John, Kenny Rogers, Johnny Mathis, Lady A., Michael W. Smith, all these people that I've had a chance to collaborate with who I have always admired. That's always a highlight."

GOING WHERE THE MUSIC IS

His upcoming tour may go down as another highlight. He's looking forward to trying out new music that might hold special meaning in different parts of the country.

"Wherever people settled as immigrants, which is everybody, they settled in places where their culture was part of the early American settlers," he said. "So, you have Appalachia, the evolution of Shaker hymns, bluegrass, all these combinations of things. I'm also celebrating the later 20th century things, like Motown and rock n' roll."

Along with playing regional music, fans at the shows will be able to use their programs for a sing along, which will be recorded and emailed to attendees the following day.

"It will also be a live by request, so there will be a lot of crowd interaction," he said. "It's very impromptu, and no two shows are alike."

And for those hoping for some holiday music, he'll embark on his Very Merry Christmas tour in late November, with stops in Kalamazoo on Dec. 13, Toledo on Dec. 14, and Cleveland on Dec. 17-18.



Baker Street hosts blues icon

Davy Knowles has played with some of music's top stars BY BILL FORMAN

Davy Knowles is not technically from Britain, but he did grow up surrounded by it. A native son of the Isle of Man, the much-acclaimed blues rocker was still in his teens when he started his first band Back Door Slam, whose 2007 debut album *Roll Away* reached No. 7 on the *Billboard* blues chart.

Over the next two years, the group played hundreds of shows, including Coachella, SXSW, Bonnaroo, and Lollapalooza, before its members moved on to pursue other projects.

For Knowles, that meant going solo, sharing stages with the likes of Joe Bonamassa, Jeff Beck, and The Who, and becoming the first musician to play live directly to the International Space Station from Mission Control in Houston.

His latest tour kicks off Friday, Sept. 30, in Cleveland, then makes its way to Baker Street Centre the following night.

Knowles spent much of 2018 and 2019 on the road performing the music of Rory Gallagher with the Irish blues icon's bandmates Gerry McAvoy and Ted McKenna.

Last October, he released his fourth album, *What Happens Next*, accompanied by accolades from musicians like Joe Satriani, who calls Knowles his favorite modern bluesman, and Peter Frampton, who' said he's the best gunslinger guitarist of the 21st century.

We recently checked in with Knowles to talk about Celtic rock, retro soul, and Britain's fascination with American blues.

Q: You recorded *What Happens Next* with Eric Corne, who's also produced a dozen albums by Walter Trout and a half-dozen more by John Mayall. Did you have any preconceived notions, before you went into the studio, that maybe changed while you were in there?

A: Well, I'm not sure that they changed. I'm a big fan of Eric's work and had been listening to a Walter Trout record he'd done that I really loved. Walter is a much more traditional blues artist than I am, but

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even though it was a very honest representation of him, it also had this kind of modern edge to it, without sounding contrived. And I was looking for that for this project. So, I mean, the preconceived notion was thinking that Eric would be able to bring something a little more contemporary to it, and he did entirely.

Q: The song "Hell to Pay" has kind of a retro-soul, Daptone Records vibe to it. Is that something you were going for?

A: Oh, yeah. I've been a huge fan of Sharon Jones especially, and also Fantastic Negrito, folks that really have that soul element. So I just wanted to try and write in that style. And I was thinking, you know, "What would Sly Stone do with the vocal phrasing?" I've always loved his tune "If You Want Me to Stay," and that was in the back of my head. So it was kind of an experiment, I'd never written like that, but I've always loved listening to it. God knows I am none of those people, but I was still really happy with it.

Q: Tell me about the Band of Friends Tour with Gerry McAvoy and Ted McKenna. I'm guessing there's a big difference between listening to Rory Gallagher's music and actually playing it onstage alongside his old bandmates.

A: Oh, God, yeah. Working with Gerry and Ted, who we lost, and then Brendan (O'Neill), who's also kind of Rory alumni, what an honor.

And yes, it truly was an education. Just the onstage work ethic and the kind of energy that Gerry was putting out, and also expecting from the rest of us. It was this idea of pushing each other, you know, "come on, come on, come on!," and not always in a gentle way. I think it's an old-school thing, and it really works. It's fabulous.

Q: I once interviewed Rory Gallagher and he talked about how much he was influenced by Big Bill Broonzy, who at that point I'd never even heard of. Why do you think it is that people from the UK seem to know more about American blues than we do over here?

A: Well, I think if you move to a foreign town, like I live in Chicago now, right?, you notice that people here don't go to the Millennium (Park) or other places like that. Because you're living here, so you don't bother. It's always there, and you can go another time, no worries. Whereas if you're just visiting, you make a huge effort. It's like, "We're going to do this, we're going to do that." And I think that, musically, it's kind of similar. People like me view American folk music as a very exotic and important thing that seems so distant.

I mean, I can recognize folk songs in Appalachia that started out in my neck of the woods, for sure. But I have got no point of reference for a Black man in the South in a god-awful prison. I have absolutely no reference for that. And so when you have something that you can't identify with, sometimes that pushes you to learn more about it, to study it, and, I don't know, "understand" is the wrong word, but certainly to appreciate it, for better or worse.

out of Austin, Texas, have done quite a unique thing in that

throughout their nearly 20-year career as a psych rock band, they've remained relevant. They've never tried being anything more than what they are, which is a dark, looming rock band. Their records are dark, fuzzed-out odes to doom, gloom, and the fading of our humanity.

On the band's newest long player, the heavy and propulsive Wilderness of Mirrors, it seems a post-COVID Black Angels are as dark and foreboding as you'd imagine: '60s acid-burnt psych melds with '70s desert cult drones, all with a dizzying dystopia that is enthralling and harrowing.

The Black Angels made one of the best modern psych rock albums with 2006's Passover, an antiwar record that wasn't peace and love and "smile on your brother" naivety. It was heavy, dark, and volatile, a molotov cocktail of a record that wasn't shy in its disdain for politics and the physical and emotional damage left in its wake. Each record that followed built on that bedrock.

"Without a Trace" comes out swinging, a mix of fuzzed-out groove and spell casting. This song is a guttural roar of acid rock and rock n' roll mysticism. "Empires Falling" is a chugging locomotive of a song, combining both early doom metal riffing and the New Wave of British Heavy Metal. The Black Angels use reverb as an essential ingredient to their sound. It's a perfect flavor to a song like this. "El Jardin" is an almost straight-up rocker, with touches of Stooges and Velvet Underground.

Throughout the 15-song, nearly 60-minute runtime there is no relenting from the grooves, the fuzz, and the overcast sky mood. From the menacing "Make It Known" to the haunted carnival feel of title track "Wilderness of Mirrors" to album closer "Suffocation" with its melancholy mood and dreamy atmosphere, The Black Angels build a dark kaleidoscope of sound and mood.

The Black Angels continue to make engaging dark psychedelic rock n' roll. With Wilderness of Mirrors, they made one of the best albums of the year. — J. Hubner

The Mars Volta

Full disclosure: I haven't been keeping up with The Mars Volta since their second album, Frances the Mute, in 2005. So, when I saw they had a

new album coming out, I was intrigued.

Centered around Omar Rodriguez-Lopez and Cedric Bixler-Zavala, The Mars Volta is a prog rock band formed from the remnants of the heavy-hitting alternative band At the Drive-In.

Following the disbanding of At the Drive-In, The Mars Volta was formed by guitarist Rodriguez-Lopez and vocalist Bixler-Zavala with other musicians coming and going, including The Red Hot Chili Peppers' guitarist John Frusciante. The band's debut album. Deloused in the Coma*torium*, was a bit experimental, but things went very avant garde with Frances the Mute, which is almost completely a 1-hour-and-17-minute song.

On their first original album since 2012's Noctourniquet. The Mars Volta have changed things up considerably.

Opening on "Blacklight Shine," you fall right into a groove that intertwines English and Spanish, but the instrumentation knows no language. It's an exquisite table-setter that's followed by "Gravevard Love," filled with several beats and with Bixler-Zavala sounding as melodic as ever.

That vibe follows throughout the record, as The Mars Volta almost sound mainstream, with "Vigil" having an almost radio-friendly sound.

'Que Dios Te Maldiga Corazon" follows with a South American vibe and "Cerulea" is a heartfelt song that is simply gorgeous and not at all what I expected. Things really getting nuts on "Palm Full of Crux," which verges on a ballad.

Despite the oddities, the songs are beautiful and show a maturity that is a far cry from Bixler-Zavala's early days of energetic screaming, and things take an acoustic turn on "Tourmaline."

The heaviest song of the album is "Equus 3." with "Collapsible Shoulders" following with an AutoTuned exhibition that somehow works and might be my favorite song on the album.

While it wasn't anything that I expected, I completely enjoy how The Mars Volta has grown with me. I'd say this album is worth a listen. — Anthony Gadson

Physical Thrills

Silversun Pickups have been bopping along for nearly 20 years, with their debut album Car-

navas dropping in 2006. What has followed is a series of decent enough alternative albums that like to think they're shoegaze, dream pop, and post-punk, but really, they're merely reflections in a scuffed up mirror of influences, inspirations, and a scene that no longer exists. The term alternative has become synonymous with bands like Imagine Dragons, Twenty One Pilots, Kings of Leon, and Foster the People. Silversun Pickups seems to fit right in.

On their sixth full-length, the band makes interesting enough songs with slick production and touches of modern pop/rock elements. These songs are about as far away from where the band started (Smashing Pumpkins-lite) as anything, giving into a last gasp at radio recognition or at the very least music licensing for commercials.

Fourteen songs of middle-of-the-road tempos, Physical Thrills is an album of endless lead-ups to nowhere. There's nothing nearly as catchy as the

Often compared to The Velvet Underground, The Feelies were one of a few bands from the East Coast



(Sonic Youth, Mission of Burma) that created their own sound and captured the new alternative/indie rock sound that so many artists have borrowed from today.

This is one of those records that takes you back to the post-Ramones punk of the late 1970s. These guys were nerdy by appearance but wrote great songs and played music for their fans, not for fame.

"Fa Ce' La" is a jumpy little number with exaggerated guitars and a hip chorus until "Loveless Love" slows things down with a quiet guitar and snappy drumming before picking up the pace as the lyrics kick in halfway through his five-minute jam.

They cover The Beatles in "Me and My Monkey," and one of my favorite tracks is "Moscow Nights." This song is what the early '80s was about: tight arrangements, sturdy vocals, and a beat that didn't kill you with too much synth or artificial drum machine. It didn't get better than this.

The album closes with the title track, which pretty much explains, note for note, the influence The Velvet Underground had on them. You can also discover the influence that they themselves had on bands like R.E.M. and The Dead Milkmen.

The band split up in 1992 but reformed in 2009 and re-released Crazy Rhythms on its 30th anniversary. - Dennis Donahue

band's first big hit "Lazy Eye." "Scared Together" is about as rousing as it gets and that's not saying much. It's the kind of "rocker" that feels written in boredom, not inspiration.

Opening track "Stillness (Way Beyond)" has gravitas and impressive production, but there's no soul. Just empty platitudes. "Hidden Moon" either wants to be Gang of Four or Red Hot Chili Peppers, but achieves neither. It's almost as if Silversun Pickups attempted to make a dance album but just didn't quite make it.

"Empty Nest" is catchy, and "We Won't Come Out" leans a bit more into Depeche Mode, while "Quicksand" meanders in piano ballad boredom.

Physical Thrills is the kind of album that will be played by fans of Carnavas and Swoon once, maybe twice, then be forgotten. It is forgettable at at best and unnecessary at worst. — J. Hubner



A couple horror flicks, *Barbarian* and *Pearl*, took the No. 4 and No. 5 spots, respectively, bringing in \$4.8 million and \$1.9 million. Can't wait to see *Pearl*. Director Ti West forever.

Thriller chooses style over substance

theaters with a whole mess of PR in tow.

Reports of casting shake-ups and alleged on-set conflicts painted the picture of a troubled production before a disjointed press circuit further exacerbated the optics surrounding the film. It's to the movie's credit that all of this baggage begins to evaporate quite quickly, like a dream upon waking, after the lights dim and the

projector begins to flicker. Unfortunately, the end result still isn't good enough to overcome all the expectations most audiences will have going into the theater, nor is it bad enough for the hate-watching crowds to get their kicks either.

Set in an idyllic community deeply steeped in mid-century architecture and fashion, *Don't Worry Darling* is told through the eyes of Alice Chambers (Florence Pugh), a stay-at-home wife who dutifully sees her engineer husband, Jack (Harry Styles), off

the house and sharing a midday martini with next-door neighbor Bunny (Olivia Wilde) before preparing a lavish dinner just in time for Jack's arrival home. Alice's Utopian life in the town of Victory starts to fall apart when her friend Margaret (KiKi Layne) begins to press Frank (Chris Pine), the founder of the all-encompassing Victory Project, for details around the enigmatic operation. After seeing a plane crash in the desert one day, Alice makes a trip to investigate the wreckage, but instead finds Victory Headquarters, causing her to ask questions similar to the ones Margaret asked before suffering an "accident."

Anyone who has seen the trailer, which played ad nauseam in theaters this summer, won't be surprised that some of the film's stronger points are its surface-level delights. The set design, location work, and production design are absolutely first-rate, meticulously evoking a 1950s postcard-prepped Palm Springs paradise that is exquisitely rendered at every turn. The masterful cinematographer Matthew Libatique, whose work on *Black Swan* underscores the ballet classes that Alice takes in this film, beautifully rendering these picturesque settings while implying a darkness under the surface. Juxtaposing the carefree doo-wop and jazz hits on the soundtrack, John Powell's haunting music score blends chopped-up breaths and grimy synths to perpetually chilling effect.

It's all fantastic window dressing, but the script dooms itself by putting all its eggs in the basket dedicated to the central mystery concerning what is really happening at Victory. Wilde occasionally drops paltry breadcrumbs leading to the late third-act development, but she spends too much time spinning her wheels with one psychological horror trope after another. Without getting into details that would constitute spoilers, the reveal feels cobbled together from other movies and TV series that have explored its implications and ramifications more thoroughly and intelligently. Wilde adds some layers of gender politics and social commentary that feel fresh and germane to the story, but not enough to triumph over the nagging questions that theatergoers will have when the credits roll.

The stacked ensemble cast, which also includes Gemma Chan and Nick Kroll, does everything they can to bring this wonderland to life. Translating the terrors of her *Midsommar* character into a somewhat similar scenario, Pugh is reliably outstanding at bringing us into the shattered psyche of a woman at odds with the perfidious paradise around her. Pine is also excellent as a confident and charismatic authority figure who conjures platitudes about progress and positivity so seductively that they start to sound profound in no time. Styles is fine conveying what is admittedly a pretty bland character, but based on the strength of his latest album, I hope he makes music a bigger priority than acting from here on.

Don't Worry Darling has plenty going for it, but ultimately comes undone by a backloaded screenplay that favors surprises over subtlety.


