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Jefferson Starship landing at Piere's

Former Jefferson Airplane member, 84, does not see reason to stop touring

With solid roots in Jefferson Airplane, which became grounded in 1973, Jefferson Starship evolved from solo albums Paul Kantner and Grace Slick had recorded.

Joined by David Freiberg, Craig Chaquico, John Barbata, Pete Sears, and Papa John Creach, Jefferson Starship released their debut album, *Dragon Fly*, in 1974.

"(Slick, Kantner, and myself) put out a couple of albums while we were waiting to see if Jefferson Airplane was going to keep going," Freiberg told Whatzup in a recent interview. "And when we finished those two albums, we realized it wasn't, so we thought that maybe we'd better do something to promote them.

"On Paul's solo album, *Blows Against the Empire*, about a bunch of hippies that hijack the first starship, he listed everybody that played on it on the cover and called them the 'Jefferson Starship Crew.' That was the first place that the name Jefferson Starship appeared."

The name of the band now appears at Piere's, where they will perform on Thursday, Dec. 1.

LINEUPS COME, GO

Between 1974-84, Jefferson Starship released eight gold or platinum albums, with their sophomore effort, *Red Octopus*, reaching No. 1 on the Billboard 200 chart in 1975,

However, even with the success, the lineup was anything but stable. $\,$

"We went through a whole lot of stuff during that time," Freiberg said. "Like in 1979, when Grace and Marty Balin quit. Both then played with Mickey Thomas for a while, though Grace did come back a few years later. Then Paul left, and the band became Starship. Then I left, too."

Kantner reformed Jefferson Starship about 1992, but that didn't stop personnel changes, including Freiberg rejoining in 2005. However, the lineup has remained stable since Kantner's death in 2016.

"The band now, as it exists, was the band that was playing with Paul when he passed away," Freiberg said.

EX-MEMBER SHINES ON

The current lineup put out *Mother of the Sun* in August 2020 as the pandemic was full blown, leaving them with few opportunities to promote it.

"Well, it was ready to go and so, what are you going to do, hold on to it?" Freiberg said. "We wanted to get it out just in the case the world was going to end.

"We did a whole lot of Zooming to promote it, but there's nothing like getting out to play it live,

and we've been doing that for the last year."

As the first album since his death, *Mother of the Sun* was fittingly dedicated to Kantner and, it turns out, the title reflects him as well.

"I think some fortune teller or seer or somebody that knows something told us that Paul was looking out for us, and we asked where he was watching from," Freiberg said. "They said Cassiopeia. Cassiopeia was the mother of the sun and moon, and since he was in Cassiopeia, we titled it Mother of the Sun."

NO REASON TO SLOW DOWN

Listen to classic rock radio for any amount of time, and there's a good change you'll hear the band's mega-hit "Jane," a song Freiberg wrote, or any one of Jefferson Starship's other iconic compositions like "Count on Me," "Find Your Way Back," and "Miracles."

Freiberg isn't sure why his band's music still appeals to fans, but he's glad to keep playing it.

"It's just a diverse collection of tunes," he said.
"It changed through the years, but whatever it was, it's always been really eclectic. It all seems to

connect though."

When Jefferson Starship hits the Piere's stage, you can expect a night full of hits, most of which you'll know by heart and some that might become new favorites.

Freiberg said they will play "a selection of tunes from the entire gamut, all the way from Jefferson Airplane all the way up to the stuff we are doing now, maybe even beyond. We're working on another new album now, if we ever get some time to get into the studio. Who knows? It goes back further, too. I was in Quicksilver Messenger Service before Jefferson Airplane, and we've been known to do a tune or two from that band, but there's plenty of songs to play from just Jefferson Starship."

At 84 years old, Freiberg has nearly six decades of professional music experience under his belt, but he doesn't see a time when he or the rest of the band will slow down.

When asked if he ever thought he'd still be playing in a band at his age, he joked, "I didn't think I'd make it 40. When I did turn 40, it was 1978 and I wrote 'Jane.' Personally, it's going pretty good. I'm still having as great a time as ever, so I don't see any reason to quit. You know, if people didn't want to listen to us, that'd be something else, but fans seem to enjoy it, so I'm going to do it as long as I can. I'm enjoying it. Having fun is the reason for living, as far as I'm concerned."

Salomon Farm opens barn doors for A Christmas Carol

Shows selling out for Summit City Theatre's new holiday tradition

A non-traditional theater company is aiming to create a new family tradition.

On Dec. 1, Summit City Music Theatre will hold their premiere of *A Christmas Carol* in Salomon Farm Park's Old Barn with half the performances already sold out for the 110-seat venue.

"Tickets are going fast," artistic director Gavin Thomas Drew said.

Shows are slated for Dec. 1-11 with Saturday and Sunday shows already sold out, as well as Friday, Dec. 2.

CONFORMING TO SPACE

The response was predicted by Drew, and the company's claim that this would become a holiday tradition appears to be correct.

"We are marketing this as an experience," he said. "There's hot chocolate and cider, and there may be some vendors. We're really aiming to make this a new Fort Wayne tradition. Just like *The Nutcracker*, we feel like there's so many cities in the world where families go to see *A Christmas Carol* every year. We wanted to bring that to Fort Wayne. We are committed to doing this every year at Salomon Farm."

The venue certainly makes it appealing for the show, but that doesn't mean there haven't been some challenges, such as pumping heat into it and getting a barn that's used for weddings and concerts ready for a stage production.

"The first challenge was that we did not have a stage," Drew said. "We have built up a stage on risers. For us, the farm has a perfect ambiance to do an 1800s show. The barn was established in 1871, so it is restored to its original glory, and we felt it was a perfect setting."

Instead of working around the setting, the crew has been working *with* it.

"It is not your typical London streets set," Drew said. "Instead, we really play with the wood grain and barn atmosphere."

For performers like Emersen Conner, who plays Martha Cratchit, the Old Barn has only created opportunities.

"It's definitely kept me on my toes, especially when it comes to there being a whole different way that you have to look at your entrances and scene changes," she said. "You're not able to hide as well as you can with traditional proscenium stage, where you have the wings and the backstage area. It comes with its challenges, but is very rewarding."

And don't expect any pyrotechnics.

"We have really pared down the props and

sets, so that we allow the acting to do the storytelling," Drew said. "It is a minimalist production of *A Christmas Carol*, but it still has the bells and whistles for the special effects, because beyond anything else, it is a ghost story of Christmas."

NON-TRADITIONAL COMPANY

If the ghosts of Christmas past, present,

and future aren't the stars, Scrooge would be, with Caleb Curtis portraying him, while Tony Didier takes on the role of Bob Cratchit, Michael Paff plays Tim Cratchit, and Abigail Ehinger handles narrating duties.

In all, there are 48 members of the cast, which were selected from more than 75 hopefuls during October auditions.

"We have put together a great team, and

we're excited to put on this show," Drew said.

This will be Conner's third production with Summit City Music Theatre, having also starred in last year's *The Addams Family* and this summer's *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*.

"What I found special about this audition was how inviting it was," Conner said, noting it required a Christmas carol, with her selecting "Silent Night." "There wasn't a lot of pressure. There weren't a lot of barriers for people that have not had a lot of theater experience. We were allowed to bring something familiar, and we saw a lot of faces that we haven't seen in the theater community."

The company prides themselves on being a bit non-traditional, choosing inclusivity over exclusivity.

"Summit City Music Theatre always works to be very inclusive in our casting," Drew said. "We have a visually impaired actress, an actor with Down syndrome. We just really wanted this to reflect our community."

And it's that kind of non-traditionalism that keeps Emersen coming back.

"I've really fallen in love with Summit City," she said. "They have such a talented, hard-working team that you just gotta come back. I was really drawn in by the immersive aspect. I feel like in the past couple of years, the theater community has fallen into a kind of complacency by remaining status quo. Being a part of something that is so non-traditional and submersive was really alluring."

COMING BACK FOR MORE

While it might be non-traditional, the company isn't swaying from the Charles Dickens' tale about the true meaning of the Christmas season

"It is a classic adaptation of *A Christ-mas Carol*," Drew said of the adaptation he co-wrote with Chapman Shields. "It's a play with music. We have a phenomenal ensemble and choir. We have 48 cast members, and then, of course, a pit with a violin and a piano."

At the conclusion of the 70-minute performance, Drew is banking on families discussing what they saw on the way home and coming back again next year to experience a truly unique experience ... that might include layered clothing.

"People need to dress cozy, but we working hard to make sure it's comfortable for everybody," he said.

Music showcase stocks up on young musicians

PFW welcomes 11 acts to Goldstock on Nov. 29 at Sweetwater Theatre

It's called Goldstock. But unlike its 1969 namesake, Goldstock won't be attended by 300,000 people, it won't be three days of peace, love, and music, and it won't be a milestone for the Baby Boomer generation.

What it will be is more achievable: a casual, friendly two- to three-hour showcase of young, up-and-coming Fort Wayne musicians on Tuesday, Nov. 29. And because it's indoors in the state-of-the-art Sweetwater Performance Theatre, and not on a remote upstate New York farm in a thunderstorm, the facilities will be much more comfortable and the sound quality will be excellent.

LEARNING EXPERIENCE

Goldstock is a concert put on by the students of professor Jason Lundgren's Survey of the Music Business class at the Purdue University Fort Wayne's School of Music. It's a class project in how to put on a show, and it's "powered by" the students and faculty of Gold-Top Records, the school's record label.

As for a music business undertaking, they named the second annual event after Woodstock, which is notoriously one of the biggest money-losing ventures in the history of the music business. But that didn't faze Lundgren.

"It had such a good ring to it, I couldn't help it," Lundgren said. But like the original Woodstock, "It is a free show and we definitely spend money to have it. So, there is some truth

Well, there's a theme here: "I wanted an event that would give my students the feel of what it's really like to work in the live music industry, just obviously on a smaller scale," Lundgren said. "So, that's why they're doing everything from creating posters, designing flyers, they're doing marketing, and creating video content. It's really just giving the students the full experience of what it's like to put on a fairly big event from start to finish and have them do all of it themselves."

TAKING THE STAGE ...

So let's get to the entertainment!

The concert will feature 11 acts, including:

The Indigo Society: A five-piece band from Fort Wayne with backgrounds in alternative rock, pop, and jazz, creating guitar-driven rock with modern flavorings. Their debut single "You're So Cold" was featured on ALT 99.5 FM/102.3 FM. They've played in clubs around town and are preparing to release an EP.

Private Education: Five friends from across the U.S. with "the power of their

passion for art and their fancy music degrees." They're working to develop a sonic style that's unique, featuring "technical yet approachable guitar wizardry and a powerful groove. They aim to thrill audiences with their well-trained musical abilities and sardonic hope that the despair of humanity may yet change." That's ambitious.

Loud Division: A group of friends from the same high school in eastern Kentucky who have been playing together since 2019. This year they released an EP, Remorse, which is available on all streaming platforms.

The Ear Mites: Described as a brand new. two-piece psychedelic surf rock band that promise to produce ear candy sure to melt your brain. They further state they rebirth sounds from the past with a modern twist, creating a cocktail of original, astral, aquatic, metal melodies, and other stuff involving a

groovy loophole into a new mind-bending galaxy where the deep blue and the planets are fused. You've been warned.

The Eleven Sevens: A group of PFW students that like to jam on classic and hard rock. They each have their own main projects but decided to come together for Goldstock.

Man of the Flood: This quintet have released an album on GoldTop Records, Crystal Bawl, and were extensively covered here in Whatzup in our Aug. 24 and Sept. 14 issues. They attempt to channel a slightly left-of-center approach to their music by marrying the beats and boops of alt pop with the driving guitars of indie rock, all thrown over complicated drum grooves.

Liyaz: A singer, songwriter, and producer who has been singing since she was very young, choosing to express herself through song. She recently released her first single,

"Stay With Me," on all the streaming platforms, with more new songs coming out soon.

Sam Trowbridge: An alternative artist who name-checks a long list of blues, indie rock, psychedelic, and alternative rock acts as influences. He said, "Art is my form of emotion and communication. The world will always need inspired artists to influence new artists." He released his 13-song album The Painter on Sept. 29. He was profiled in our Aug. 10 issue and is a Whatzup 20 Under 20 honoree.

WORKING RELATIONSHIP


Here at Whatzup, we are the press, and the students putting on Goldstock include publicists, whose job it is to service information to the press.

ow I understand what Carly Rae Jepsen meant when she sang, "I wasn't looking for this, but now you're in my way" on her 2012 mega-hit "Call Me Maybe." But while she referred to a love interest, it could just as well been about a hamburger.

Stopping into **Liberty Diner** at the corner of Coliseum Boulevard and Goshen Road, I was minding my own business, and I wasn't ready for what was about to happen.

On a dry erase board, there it was, an announcement for the Liberty Monster Burger: two half-pound patties of ground steak, topped with cheese, bacon, tomato, lettuce, onions, pickle, and relish.

I didn't set out to get it, but its siren's song whispered as I leafed through the menu. "Why not?" I thought.

but it didn't come close to matching the reality.

Path The description was big and bold, DEAN JACKSON

It's a monster in the way a Brontosaurus is a dinosaur or Everest is a mountain.

When it arrived, it towered. The only thing keeping this leviathan together was the steak knife. It was thick, messy, and hard to control ... and I loved it.

The true critic, my oft-quoted daughter gasped when she laid eyes on it and it drew the attention of other patrons.

After resorting to a fork to eat the behemoth, it proved too much, and I had to take half of it home with me. When I finished it off later, it was just as delightful as when I first experienced it.

Truly, I left feeling like this was the best burger in town and, no hype, probably the best burger I've had anywhere.

This is the type of offering that other places would promote with billboards and photos. This is could be on the Food Network or national publications. It will set you back about \$20, but it's worth consideration, even if you need two days to consume it.

Rack & Helen's: Like it was never gone

For the Rack & Helen's family, there's even more to be thankful for this holiday season.

First, they've been open a few weeks following last summer's fire. The owners are enjoying loyal guests, and workers can say they were still involved and employed even when it wasn't open for business.

After spending part of an evening there, I left feeling like it really was never gone.

"We got our (butts) kicked," one overwhelmed employee told me about how busy they were trying to keep up with orders shortly after the New Haven favorite reopened this month.

Days after a blaze ripped through the back of the pub, the entire crew dove right in to restore it. Instead of pouring beers, bartenders were pounding hammers. Servers were slapping down paint.

It was a collaboration of cooks right there with construction guys, as the owners kept staff working by having them involved with the rehab project.

So, what's different? Not much.

The back entrance is metal; I remember it being wood. The smell of barbecue is ever so slightly set off by the new building smell and scent of fresh timber.

It's so seamless that regulars hardly know. That's probably the best compliment for the joint.

When I went last week, I went with a buddy, a longtime devotee who now lives about an hour away.

I asked him about his impressions. He looked at me in disbelief. He didn't even know they were closed. He didn't know about the fire.

Blues laid foundation for misfit Erin Coburn

Young musician bringing energy to **Baker Street show**

She might only be 21 years old. but Erin Coburn is a veteran of the music industry.

Starting out in blues, the southern Ohio native released her first album, Chaos Before Conformity, at just 14. Since then, she's released Queen of Nothing and Out From *Under*, with each progressing toward a more rock sound.

She remains rooted in the blues, but when she returns to Baker Street Centre on Dec. 3, you can expect a different kind of show.

'When we do live shows, I love to jump around, jump off the drums ... I get on the floor, I go into the audience, I just love that energy of rock," she said in an interview with Whatzup. "I've been writing more songs like that, like Fall Out Boy or Cage the Elephant. Definitely going another direction, but it will always have that underlying tones of the blues."

WHOLE NEW WORLD

Before she even knew the word blues, Coburn was drawn to the guitar, taking a liking to one her father received as an anniversary gift before she was even born.

"I picked it up when I was little, and thought, 'Oh, this is awesome!'" she said. "So they got me my own acoustic guitar when I was around 6 or 7, but I was the worst student. I did not want to practice anything people gave to me, because it was boring and all I wanted to do was write my own stuff and play around with it myself and explore the instrument."

Going through instructors, Coburn's parents found one that worked when they came upon John Redell. Through his teaching, Coburn's love for the instrument, and the blues, took off.

"He blew my mind, because he started playing the blues," she said. "I was like, 'Oh my God,' I had heard my parents play it on the radio, but

hearing it right in front me and hearing this guitar guru just make up guitar solos right on the spot, out of his mind. I was like, 'How do you do that? Teach me how to do that."

He did teach her, but he also showed her the meaning of the blues, taking her to jam sessions. And if the players in the club were surprised to a see a pre-teen waltz in, she was just as taken aback.

"I was mortified when I first got there, because the bass player at one open jam, he was this older guy, just super intense: The image you think of when you think of grumpy bass player, that was him," she said. "But they were all super nice, but I was little 12-year-old or 11-year-old."

HITTING THE STUDIO

Over time, Coburn became more comfortable at the open mics and even began incorporating their stories into her lyrics.


While she said, "There was too much drama in middle school and high school," she also points out that songs like "Charred Heart" on her debut came about by time in the jam sessions.

"I always heard them talking about their life problems, so I think I drew from that as well, and hearing, 'Oh, this is what adults go through." she said. "It made an impact."

Writing all her own lyrics and instrumentation, Coburn did not have a goal to record an album, but her parents voiced their support. With songs written while she was 12 and 13, Coburn recorded Chaos Before Conformity at a small studio in Indiana, and it was released in

A couple years later, Coburn was back at it, but ratcheted up the production value, heading to Clarksdale, Mississippi, to record at Gary Vincent's studio.

"That experience, I was a little more intimidated, because it was so far away and they had worked with Morgan Freeman, doing voice overs" Coburn said. "But it was really cool to get out of my comfort zone. That album challenged me to get different sounds using techniques, because Gary records a lot of older blues things. I used some amps down there that are super vintage. I used Les Paul's guitars that he

owned, because he and Gary were good friends. It was real cool to use gear that had a lot of mojo in it."

Queen of Nothing was released in 2017, the same year Coburn was nominated in the Best Blues category at the Cincinnati Entertainment Awards. In 2018, she was nominated as Young Adult Artist of the Year at the 2018 Josie Awards.

Coburn continued to grow musically with 2019's Out From Under. which she recorded at Lava Room Recording in the Cleveland suburb of Independence, Ohio. Saying that was the first "modern studio" she had worked in, Coburn returned there during the pandemic, studying audio engineering and seeking a certification in ProTools.

With knowledge gained, Coburn now has her own studio where she is putting out her most ambitious music, beginning with 2020's "The MisFIT," which caused her some

"I was so nervous, because I was

like, 'Everyone that liked my first three albums are probably going to hate this." she said. "I just need to remember that artists are always evolving."

To remember that, Coburn looked to Samantha Fish. She also began as a young artist and began transitioning from traditional blues to a more rock sound.

"I know she was probably nervous to release her new album, because it even has some rap artists featured on it, which is so cool, but a lot of her fans were traditional," Coburn said of Fish. "I think she was afraid she'd get some push back on that, and I was the same way. After she released her album, and people were like, 'I love her for her and her artistry,' I thought that was super inspiring."

FINDING HERSELF

Feeling more freedom, Coburn released the rocking "Flip" in 2021 and "Sleeve" in June, which might

make its way onto an album she hopes to release in 2023.

"I really love the energy of rock music and how broad it is, too," she said. "My first and second albums, and even the third, are much more bluesy and traditional, but I love the energy."

And that energy led to a change in her on-stage persona, coincidentally shortly after her last stop in Fort Wavne in 2018.

After opening for The Marcus King Band at what was then known as C2G, Coburn was playing at Kalamazoo State Theatre when she had her own wardrobe mishap.

"My heel got caught on my dress, and I went down during a guitar solo," she said. "You could hear the whole audience gasp, but I fell on beat, so that was good. After that, I was like, 'I can't jump, I can't run around in all this stuff I'm wearing."

Now rocking what she describes as Star Wars "stormtrooper boots," Coburn is free to go wild, which often includes jumping and falling to her knees for those classic blues guitar solos.

INTIMATE EXPERIENCE

Coburn points to highlights such as opening for The Marcus King Band and Blackberry Smoke, performing with Grammy-winning artists Joseph Wooten and Dana Robbins, and playing a plethora of festivals. But she knows she hasn't reached the mountaintop.

"There's a lot of work that goes into it," she said. "A lot of people think, 'Oh, I'm going to put out this single and I'm going to blow up.' It is a lot of work, but that's the whole job description. It's a journey.

"It's just cool to see the climb," she added.

That climb has included smaller clubs, which Coburn says she doesn't mind because it's part of the process and she enjoys interacting

"Those are sometimes my favorite," she said. "I'm kind of weird, because I love to stare directly at people in the audience. I just love to create that connection, and with smaller venues, I can do that.

"Whether you're playing to a crowd of two people or 2,000, just put on a good show, because I'd be happy that one person made it, honestly."

The Backseat Lovers

Waiting To Spill

Building and breathing a life into itself. The Backseat Lovers roar into their sophomore record,



Waiting To Spill, with a refined sound that separates this project from their previous effort. The constantly rising feeling through each track cleanly illustrates the themes of growing up as well as the emotional buildup implied by the title. Three years after their debut, When We Were Friends. The Backseat Lovers have really come into their own with this album, showcasing the sound that brought them their success while unafraid to grow and change.


Joshua Harmon's raw, breaking vocals perfectly parallel the subject matter and carry an air of uncertainty, but this has always been a strength for the band. The uniqueness of this piece comes in the thick instrumentation, quite uncharacteristic of their previous releases. The lush synth patches of "Morning in the Aves" and the piano-focused "Words I Used" with its full string orchestration and almost Beatles-like vocal/piano break sections mark a distinct sonic evolution for the band. Another highlight is the natural, intimate cut "Snowbank Blues," which seems to bring you right into the room, sitting and listening to your friends playing acoustic guitar.

The instrumentation and performances aren't all that make this record special, however. The production is dreamy, dynamic, and isn't afraid to leave the vocals a little darker or buried when necessary, still holding them front and center when they hold the spotlight, a rare balance in a such a well-produced modern record.

The Backseat Lovers are certainly one to watch. Their quick and steady growth over the past couple years has brought them to the forefront of the indie rock scene. They aren't afraid to grow, and Waiting To Spill makes this clearer than ever. If you're looking for a guitar-driven breath of fresh air, just close your eyes and follow the sound. — Quinn Heiking

and composer was an enigmatic musical mind in the '60s and '70s. First as a staff producer at Chess Records in the 1960s, where he was the creative force behind artists like Rotary Connection, Minnie Riperton, Marlena Shaw, Muddy Waters, Howlin Wolf, Terry Callier, The Dells, The Emotions, and many more. He's also known for his work with Earth, Wind, and Fire, Deniece

Williams, and Ramsey Lewis going into the '70s.

Stepney passed away at the age of 45 in 1976. He left behind 4-track tapes filled with home recordings he'd made in the basement studio of his family's home on the south side of Chicago.

Step on Step is a joyous double LP that celebrates a musical genius and his love of musical creation. The album is absolute joy, and feels like an intimate look inside a creative mind buzzing at full force.

Step on Step is 23 tracks that range from snippets of ideas to full-on groovy '70s funk, created on what sounds like a primitive drum machine, electric piano, and a Moog synthesizer. Stepney uses the Moog and keys in place of his typical orchestrations he'd write for artists like Earth, Wind, and Fire and Ramsev Lewis.

Musically, we're in the early to mid-70s, and Stepney locks into that world of soulful funk. Think Talking Book-era Stevie Wonder, Freshera Sly and the Family Stone, and everything in between. "Gimme Some Sugar" struts and sways with funky electric piano and synth bass. You can't listen to this without bopping your head. "Gotta Dig It To Dig It" is the best Sly Stone song that Sly Stone never wrote. "No Credit for This" has a longing melancholy to it.

The songs on Step on Step are timeless and timely. Stepney was a composer and multi-instrumentalist with the head and heart of a true musical genius. These 4-track demos are a step into his mind and show a man with an endless well of talent. Though he died before these songs could see the light of day, Stepney's songs are now getting the audience they deserve. — J. Hubner

Here It Is: A Tribute to Leonard Cohen

Leonard was more a poet than a songwriter. Even when his melodies were at their strongest, they were never



a match for the imagery of his lyrics. That's fine, though, because his songs' bare elegance leaves plenty of room for interpretation by the many, many artists who have covered them.

This latest tribute album of Cohen's songs is at its best when the artists put their own mark on the minimalist canvas that Cohen left for them.

The interpretation begins with producer Larry Klein's assembly of a jazz ensemble to tackle new arrangements of the songs. The jazz-centric approach brings a lightness to Cohen's stark melodies that was rarely there in the originals.

Most of the album's vocalists give the songs an appealingly innovative go, too. Sarah McLachlan gets perhaps the album's most thankless assignment: covering Cohen's most over-exposed song, "Hallelujah." She does well, largely stripping away the melodrama that most singers drench the song in. Gregory Porter does well by "Suzanne," also, bringing some gospel emotion to its otherwise subdued melody. Mavis Staples does even better with "If It Be Your Will."

Not everyone got the memo about originality,

Backtracks CLASSIC ALBUMS

Ian Hunter lan Hunter (1975)

Life after Mott the Hoople went very well for Ian Hunter. In fact, this debut solo extended his



career, and through 2016 Hunter had produced more than 15 records. This was the first of several with guitarist Mick Ronson and was a beefy rock album from the former lead singer of a celebrated group.

It opens with the familiar "Once Bitten, Twice Shy," a track that was revived and covered by Great White in 1989. "Who Do You Love" maintains the glam vibe with a groovy piano from Hunter but highlights Ronson's talent as a rock guitarist. And "Lounge Lizard" has a Mott the Hoople vibe as it sloshes around for more than four minutes with some respectable percussion from Dennis Elliott (who went on to form Foreigner). The tempo is toned down in the stunning "3,000 Miles from Here" as a nice segue into the bluesy-prog number "The Truth, the Whole Truth, Nuthin' but the Truth." One of the longer tracks on the album, it also gives Ronson a chance to stretch his guitar chops and meets all the criteria for a mid-'70s blues-jam number.

"It Ain't Easy When You Fall" also brings the temperature of the album down, but this is a more aggressive ballad than "3,000 Miles" from Side One. Again, Hunter tickles the piano in a track that has a waltzy feel for almost six minutes. But the closer, "I Get So Excited," reminds you of the Hoople sense of British blues and completes an album that continues to sound fresh even today.

Ronson (who made his name with David Bowie) went on to record with Hunter, Bob Dylan, Lou Reed, and others in a career that lasted more than 25 years. He passed away in 1993. Hunter has toured sparingly since 2016 and is rumored to be releasing a record in 2023. — Dennis Donahue

though. Peter Gabriel turns in his most earnest Cohen impression on "Here It Is," which is ironic since Cohen used Sharon Robinson's vocals to mask his own on the 2001 original. Iggy Pop at least cranks his raspy baritone into exaggeration on "You Want It Darker" so that he finds the essence of Cohen's vocals instead of just mimicking them. His take points out that mimicry isn't the way to go in paying tribute to an artist who was always a much better writer than a performer. — Evan Gillespie

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



Dark comedy serves just deserts

omedian Patton Oswalt has a hilarious bit titled "Great Food Is Cooked By Psychos," in which he equates his past love for out-there authors and musicians to his recent adoration with worryingly eccentric chefs. It's a notion that HBO's *Succession* director Mark Mylod and *The Onion* alums Seth Reiss and Will Tracy must have had in mind when crafting the razor-sharp black comedy *The Menu*.

As one would hope, the jokes in the film cut a bit deeper than, "Hey, isn't it funny how tiny the portions

We meet Margot (Anya Taylor-Joy) and Tyler (Nicholas Hoult) as they board a boat with 10 others who are also traveling to Hawthorne, a luxury restaurant situated on a private island. Each couple is paying

\$2,500 to savor a meal made by idiosyncratic celebrity chef Julian Slowik (Ralph Fiennes) and his slavishly devoted kitchen staff. When the group arrives, they're given a tour of the grounds by austere maître d' Elsa (Hong Chau) before heading inside the lavishly designed restaurant. Slowik's introduction and the amuse-bouche seem normal enough, but with each subsequent course, his preambles get stranger and the mood in the dining room gets more tense. Even though fanboy Tyler is still enraptured by the experience, Margot's unwillingness to eat any of the prepared food draws Slowik's ire and curiosity.

Pretentious foodies and the ultra-rich may make for soft targets in a satire, but *The Menu* serves them their just deserts just the same. When the guests first arrive, the mood is not dissimilar from an Agatha Christie whodunnit, but as the night goes on, the film turns into more of a playful dark comedy about the kinds of people who would pay this much for food. There's the Anton Ego-esque food critic and her obsequious editor, a trio of tech bros, a washed up actor with his assistant, and a businessman and his wife, who converse as if they're enjoying soup and breadsticks at Olive Garden. Even before Slowik sardonically dispenses with moral judgments about who these people are and why he suspects they've come, it's clear none of them actually care about his cooking in the first place.

Margot wasn't Tyler's originally intended guest, which seems to concern Elsa right away and is brought to Slowik's attention shortly after, so she is immediately seen as being outside of this typically sealed system. Fiennes and Taylor-Joy are outstanding scene partners as the chef calls Margot back to the kitchen for a series of terse conversations where they poke and prod at one another to gain understanding of their respective mindsets. Editor Christopher Tellefsen cuts these jagged-edge exchanges with a serrated knife, but when the night gets more twisted, he moves to a butcher's knife, punctuated by Slowik's loud claps to introduce courses, to savor the intensity of the moment.

Obviously, there are tantalizing (and occasionally ludicrous) plot developments that you'll want to avoid knowing specifics about going into the movie, but

suffice it to say, there are some delectable turns peppered throughout the film.

As much as this is a cheeky parable about the 1 percent and the people who serve them, *The Menu* is obviously a movie about the art of preparing food and all the emotions that come along with it.

There is a scene of catharsis that recalls last year's transcendent Pig, a film also set in the high-end restaurant scene, but used in a way to gain understanding into how the characters live their lives once the meal is over. For most of its runtime, *The Menu* isn't nearly that earnest, and its primary aim is to skewer its band of obscenely rich patrons. As such, it's a more superficial effort and not as satisfying as a movie that has more interest in its characters. But like a plate of burger and fries from your favorite fast-food spot, *The Menu* will fill you up and put a smile on your face.
