

St. Paul show might sound a bit alien

Neo-soul band excited to perform psychedelic music as tour kicks off at Clyde

In the decade since St. Paul & The Broken Bones came out of Birmingham, Alabama, the eight-piece outfit have made a name for themselves as a horn-driven neo-soul act fronted by Paul Janeway.

While the pandemic kept Janeway and company from touring, the creative juices continued to flow. The result was last year's *The Alien Coast*, the group's fourth studio album and its debut on ATO Records.

Fans will hear many of the songs off that effort when the group kick off their tour on Friday, Jan. 27, at The Clyde Theatre with opening act Rett Madison.

TRYING SOMETHING NEW

Unlike 2014's *Half the City* and the 2016 follow-up *Sea of Noise*, which were more straightforward with their R&B and soul-fueled nuances, the band's latest outing features songs wrapped in psychedelia and surrealism and the title cribbed from a history book about the Gulf Coast.

He discovered how settlers were puzzled by their new environs and dubbed it the Alien Coast. It was this kind of thinking that influenced the direction of this new set of songs.

"I really feel like what we did here was along the lines of having a musical fever dream," Janeway said. "And while I was busy during the pandemic welcoming my first child into the family, I had lots of time to dig into subjects like 17th century Italian sculpture, Greek mythology, and dystopian science fiction."

Adding to the new approach were another couple of firsts: The decision to record in the collective's Birmingham hometown for the first time and team up with The Mountain Goats' and Margo Price's producer Matt Ross-Spang.

"It was a nice change to come home and try something different, especially when we were going down such a different path," Janeway said. "And what was also great was how everyone in the band came to the session and were able to throw in all these different kinds of ideas that made for some really interesting outcomes."

Helping lead the charge was bassist/founding member Jesse Phillips, whose efforts found him rafting a beat and bassline he drew out of a newly purchased Korg minilogue analog synth for "The Last Dance," a chugging anthem driven by a hypnotic groove.

ART PLAYS A PART

Art loomed large for Janeway, who found himself being inspired by 15th-century Spanish painter Bartolomé Bermejo and fellow Iberian

Pablo Picasso. "Bermejo and the Devil," a shimmering gem paced by a sturm-und-drang beat and spooky whispered harmonies, came out of the vocalist viewing the former's "Saint Michael Triumphs over the Devil" at The National Gallery in London. Picasso provided the spark for "Minotaur," a jam soaked in Janeway's falsetto vocal that undulates over a loop conjured up by guitarist Browan Lollar and inspired by the late Cubist's habit of using the fictional monster as an alterego in his work.

"Man, I got the chills looking at that (Bermejo) painting," Janeway said. "It was terrifying how clearly you could see the devil in this painting. And with 'Minotaur,' it's all about recognizing inner fear, trying to avoid it and how lonely that can be."

OPENING FOR THE STONES

While *The Alien Coast* may mark quite an abrupt musical shift for the band, Janeway points to their roots in Birmingham clubs as being a prime incubator for what was spawned on album.

"The music scene is pretty diverse," he said. "You have hip-hop, indie rock, metal, and all sorts of genres of music. So for us, it kind of shaped us

because there really wasn't a certain way to go because there are not a lot of bands out of Birmingham that tour. It's not a place for that. We were one of the first ones in a while to do that. For me, there was a club in Birmingham called the Bottle Free Café, that's unfortunately not there anymore. It was the place where we really cut our teeth and where I played in the first band that'd I'd ever been in outside of church. It's where I met Jesse, and the whole idea was for me and Jesse to make a record and be good friends and then go our separate ways."

What was supposed to be a musical lark found St. Paul & The Broken Bones expanding beyond their humble beginnings and getting a huge break in opening for The Rolling Stones.

"It's one of those things that will be written on our tombstones," he said with a laugh. "You don't understand the gravity of it until it actually happens.

"For me, I didn't grow up listening to The Rolling Stones because I grew up only listening to religious music. To the guys, that was it. It's a legacy builder. It was one of those things that no matter what happens to us, nobody can take that away from us. You look at the legacy of people that opened up for the Stones and it's pretty amazing. Prince opened up for the Stones."

Fast-forward to the present day and Janeway and his crew are ready to unleash *The Alien Coast* on music-starved concert-goers.

"It's going to be really interesting sharing all the cool stuff we've been doing in the studio," he said. "I can't wait to see the reactions of all our fans to our brand of boundary-breaking beauty."

Secret's out: New album released by Secret Mezzanine

Living across country does not stop group from sticking together

Secret Mezzanine is not letting distance break them apart.

The indie rock band of Cai Caudill, Rob Greene, Garrett Spoelhof, and Jacob Sherfield formed in Fort Wayne, but as the years have gone by, the members have become scattered across the country. Six years after the quartet came together in the Summit City, Greene is the only one that remains, with Caudill in Bloomington, Spoelhof in Chicago, and Sherfield in San Francisco.

"For most of our gigs, we will play a threepiece, where we'll be in Bloomington, and Garrett and I will drive down there," Greene said. "We have found that a nice middle area is Lafayette, so we've been playing a lot there. We did small tour a couple months ago, and Jacob flew to Chicago.

"He's just willing to do it," he said about Sherfield flying cross-country for some gigs. "It's not like we're doing this for money. It's mostly just for fun and the enjoyment of playing."

Even though they are spread across the country, they're still creating music. Their third full-length album, *Field Guide to American Houses*, hits streaming services on Friday, Jan. 20.

LEARNING ON THE GO

Prior to recording albums, Secret Mezzanine was just Caudill and Greene playing music together after meeting at Canterbury. Noticing that they liked similar music, they began playing together with Caudill learning on the go.

"I didn't know how to play an instrument, but I built one," Caudill said. "I built a ukulele out of a cigar box, and I figured I should learn

to play. Rob taught me, then we just started playing together."

Shortly after, they were performing around the city with a pair of ukuleles before Spoelhof came aboard. The trio went on to win a Battle of the Bands competition at the University of Saint Francis in 2014. The win allowed them to record a five-song EP, with Sherfield working as their engineer as a Saint Francis student.

What they recorded was *Passing Dream*, which Greene does not really consider part of the band's catalog.

"It's one of those things where you go back and listen to it now, and you laugh about a lot of things," he said. "You hear the mistakes you made, but it was a really great experience. It's just about learning at that point."

MAKING ALBUMS

With Sherfield coming aboard on drums, and Spoelhof, whom Greene refers to as a "Swiss Army Knife," on keyboard, the current Secret Mezzanine was formed.

The four recorded their debut album, *Ash to Ash*, in 2017 while Caudill, Greene, and Spoelhof were seniors in high school, Caudill and Greene at Canterbury and Spoelhof at North Side. The three went on to enroll at Indiana University in Bloomington, and the EP *Thought of Man* followed in 2018. Their second full album, *No Context*, came out in the winter of 2021.

RECORDING AND MIXING PROCESS

Like they did for No Context, the group

recorded *Field Guide to American Houses* at Russian Recording in Bloomington, which has worked with such acts as Built to Spill, M. Ward, Deerhoof, of Montreal, Why?, and Mac DeMarco.

Following the seven-day session last spring, Spoelhof began mixing from Chicago, keeping everyone in the loop on how things were coming along thanks to the internet.

"I know nothing about how to make things sound good, but I have a pretty good ear," Caudill said of helping Spoelhof mix. "So I would tell him what I felt, with me being the one that wrote a fair amount of the record and him being the one to know how to make it happen."

The finished product is something Greene feels reflects on how the four have grown.

"It's definitely more mature than our older stuff," Greene said. "It's the first time we've had control over the sound with Garrett mixing it. He really has it dialed in on how we want it to sound."

RELEASING SINGLES

Greene says being able to play more live shows than they were able to with past albums has helped with streaming numbers, beginning with the first single, "One More Night," released on Nov. 4.

"In the first couple of days, it had more streams than all over our previous stuff," he said.

"Backseat" was released on Dec. 9, and "Did It Rain" was the latest number, hitting major platforms on Jan. 6.

As far as live local shows go, Caudill played solo gigs at Deer Park Irish Pub on Dec. 30 and 31, but unfortunately Greene was out of town. They hope to book a local show during a tour they're putting together for March, which hits the East Coast and Great Lakes.

As for the guys, they say distance doesn't affect them much as their friendship takes precedent over the band.

"We're all just the closest friends each of us has," Caudill said. "We love making music, but we would go out of our way to see each other even if we weren't playing together."







Shriners bringing the circus back to Coliseum

Mizpah Shrine event returns to town with lots of family favorites

For nearly 80 years, the Mizpah Shrine Circus been circled on calendars of area residents.

It's a point of reference for children of all ages to look at and remember when they took a field trip to see the circus acts at Memorial Coliseum. Another chapter comes to town Jan. 27-29.

SOMETHING FOR KIDS

Steve Trump has been involved with Fort Wayne's favorite circus since 1984, the last dozen as director. He says the circus has become a well-oiled machine of acts, animals, volunteers, students, and fans.

"It's worked for nearly 80 years," he said. "We've got it down, kind of after all these years, to where it's pretty smooth. Everybody works together. Everybody looks forward to it."

The circus serves as a fundraiser for the Mizpah Shrine, allowing Shriners to do community events and outreach throughout the year. However, the circus itself is a gift to the community.

Seeing elementary students fill Memorial Coliseum is a special privilege. Every year, the first performance is reserved for kids. The result is thousands and thousands of elementary students from Indiana, Ohio, and Michigan, some from as far as two hours away.

"We've had the bottom (bowl of the Coliseum) pretty stuffed full," Trump said. "A few times, we had to open the upper part. So we're in the vicinity of 6,000 students."

Even by Trump's conservative guess, it looks like an invasion of buses in the parking lot.

"I would say we get close to 100 schools involved," he said. "I bet there are 20 counties (reached). We get people coming up here from Kokomo. We get them out of Michigan, Kokomo, Plymouth, South Bend, Elkhart. They come from Ohio, I mean everywhere. It's crazy where we send tickets to."

29 at Memorial Coliseum.

The show is funded through ticket sales, corporate sponsorships, and other marketing. Volunteers with the local Shriners group make it work with hours upon hours of year-round work.

"We've had good outreach. We've tried really hard to actually sell the circus all year long," Trump said. "We have signs up everywhere, even at other events. We put up circus posters and things like that."

Trump says the fraternal organization rarely has trouble finding volunteers. Many, if not most, come back year after year because it's such a tight-knit group.

It's a formula that works.

Even the radio and television commercial jingle is part of the formula, and it has stayed the same since the 1980s: "The Shriiiiine Circus: Three rings of fun."

"People tell us, 'They don't even listen to what the announcer is saying (during the commercial), then that music comes on (and it grabs their attention),' Trump said.

What does change is the event itself.

There's a reasonable chance the act may change for any number of reasons, with one being how attitudes about the circus and animals have changed over the years.

"The only thing we've really lost is the cats," Trump said. "There's only one cat in the United States anymore, because they're hard to find. They won't let them (import) them over here from the countries that have big cats. The elephants are still here."

The Shrine Circus' promoter and organizer, Tarzan Zerbini, is one of the few remaining groups that have elephants, but just like the big cats, elephants' days in the circus could be numbered.

According to Trump, the promoter has a sanctuary for elephants that has programs that are accredited. The sanctuary works with groups for tours and events and the programs are well regarded.

"The Zerbini family is well known for elephant care, but either way, elephants will soon be a thing of the past," Trump said. "You can't buy more, you can't bring any more in. So I'm guessing probably, eventually, the elephants will be gone."

Animal care is a priority. Local authorities inspect animal conditions and treatment during the show at Memorial Coliseum.

"Every show they are there, just like the fire marshal," Trump said. "The animal guy wanders around constantly. He's upstairs, downstairs, everywhere. He watches everything. They're here constantly. They are being monitored nonstop."

It's evolving, maybe more than we know.

"I think the circus has changed a bit. Not a lot. I mean, it's tradition," Trump said. "I think it went to more motorized stuff. It seems like the kids nowadays like motorcycles that do the jumps, you know, and go out and do the loop de loops and all that kind of stuff. They love that kind of stuff."

But you can always count on the circus having clowns, acrobats, high-wire walkers, and trapeze artists. Daredevils and some animal acts will always have a place in the circus of the future.

They try to keep the show fresh, he said.

"We change up the acts every year," he said. "I know we're gonna have elephants. We're gonna have horses. Some motorcycle highwire acts. We'll have trapeze stuff. We're trying to get a good mix."

FREE CIRCUS FAIR

The annual free circus fair also returns in the basement of Memorial Coliseum. There children can enjoy a petting zoo, face painting, and more an hour before and after the show.

"We try to keep it really family friendly," Trump said. "We don't want anything that shouldn't be here. You know, we've tried to carry that theme through all the time, so the family can come."





Rocker Alice Cooper returns to Coliseum



> In between, the tour makes a stop in Fort Wayne on Tuesday, May 2, for a show at Memorial Coliseum.

> This will be Cooper's fifth visit to the Coliseum since 1972, and his first since Nov. 5, 1987.

Clearly, he's been back in town playing at Embassy Theatre and Foellinger Theatre over the years. If you recall, Cooper guitarist Nita Strauss left the band last year to serve in Demi Lovato's backing group,

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

Dance Collective receives \$10,000 grant

The Fort Wayne Dance Collective has been approved by the National Endowment for the Arts to receive a Challenge America

award of \$10,000.

The Collective will use the grant to support its Dance for Diverse Abilities program, providing movement and rhythm classes and performance opportunities for people who have a disability on a year-round basis, at more than 20 community partner locations.

This grant is one of 262 Challenge America awards totaling \$2.62 million that were announced by the NEA

as part of its first round of fiscal year 2023 grants.

During the grant period, FWDC will host more than six performances that include students from the D4DA program. These annual performances include the Choreographer's Lab, June Family Concert, Collective Expressions, and Halloween Show.

Central to the D4DA program is the opportunity for people who have disabilities to dance in public performances and have their artistry celebrated. The northeast Indiana community benefits from having access to high-quality, entertaining performances that feature diverse casts of dancers.

"We at the Fort Wayne Dance Collective are grateful for this opportunity through the National Endowment for the Arts," executive director Lee Rainboth said in a statement. "The support available through Challenge America will allow us to reach even more individuals with diverse abilities in our community through inspirational power of the movement arts."

The organizations signed a two-year agreement, with an option for another year, for the team to play its home games on Kevin Donley Field at Bishop D'Arcy Stadium.


In addition, Fort Wayne FC's principal owner, Mark Music, will donate a state-of-the-art video scoreboard to upgrade the current scoreboard.



Downtown Huntington pub returns

In historic downtown Huntington, Silver Moon Pub is back in business. Actually, it's the third incarnation of the establishment that's had the names Silver Moon Café, Silver Moon Saloon, and The Rusty Dog Irish Pub with roots to the 1880s.



The new year has not provided much bad weather, but the sun has disappeared on many occasions. And if you have lived in Indiana for any amount of time, you don't have to be told about how the seemingly never-ending gray days can turn even the sunniest disposition upside down.

To break the monotony, Fort Wayne Parks & Recreation will hosts its 12th annual Winterval on Saturday, Jan. 28. Nearly a dozen activities are planned at various locations downtown and nearby with, dare we say, something for everyone.

"During winter, people are cooped up, so our hope is to get them out of their houses and get them away from the TV for a while to enjoy the weather, participate, and have fun," said Patti Davis, superintendent of recreation for the parks department. "We try to cover all interests."

WINTER HIKE & BONFIRE

The day begins at 9 a.m. with a free Winter Hike and Bonfire at Lindenwood Nature Preserve, near the University of Saint Francis. Hike on one of the four trails to gain a cold weather perspective of nature as animals change their habits to adapt to the environment. Or you can simply take advantage of an unlimited number of spots that are great for wildlife viewing, photography, and relaxation.

WINTER AT THE CONSERVATORY

At 10 a.m., Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory will host Winterval at the Conservatory until 3 p.m., featuring a free ice carving outdoors that will remain on display near the main entrance. Regular admission fees apply for indoor festivities that include a Calicool craft, plant giveaway, and exploration of the *California Dreamin*' winter exhibit.

NOUVELLE ANNÉE 1743

At the Old Fort, you can celebrate Nouvelle Année 1743, or the French New Year, beginning at 10 a.m.. Be whisked back in time for an authentic look at life among French colonial settlers, soldiers, and their Native American allies in January 1743 at Fort St. Phillipe and Post des Myaamia (Miami). Reenactors in period wardrobe will highlight the struggles and victories the people of that time would

have experienced in an educational and entertaining afternoon.

WINTERVAL AT SCIENCE CENTRAL

Also at 10 a.m., Science Central opens their doors for Winterval-themed activities, offering thought-provoking expositions that are available on a daily basis designed to spark the imagination.

WARM HEART MARKET

From noon to 5 p.m., the Community Center hosts Warm Heart Market, showing off wares from several local vendors. Pick up some handmade crafts or jewelry, find that perfect article of clothing, or grab something to eat to satisfy your hunger.

WINTER CARNIVAL

After browsing vendors for a while, you can wander outside the Community Center at 1 p.m. for the Winter Carnival, featuring an incredible candy luge along with activities for the kids. An *Antique Roadshow*-type booth will be on site for adults, held in partnership with local auctioneers Scheerer McCulloch, so attendees are encouraged to bring in items they would like to be appraised.

HEADWATERS ICE SKATING

While it's not unique to Winterval, Headwaters Park will be open for ice skating from noon-9 p.m. Now in its 21st year, Headwaters Ice Skating Rink provides fun for all ages and has become an tradition for many families. This will likely be a particularly well-attended event, so get there early to provide maximum skating time. Remember that Café at the Rink will have food and beverages for sale to help you get through the afternoon.

HEARTLAND MUSHERS

Also at Headwaters Park, the Heartland Mushers will demonstrate the sport of dog sledding from 1-4 p.m. A form of transportation that dates back to at least 6000 BC, dog sledding is relied upon for mobility by many people around the world and has become a highly competitive sport. Attendees will be allowed to interact with the dogs, ask questions of organization members, and find out which breeds are perfect for this purpose.

Band worked on new songs during pandemic

South Bend natives Umphrey's McGee are celebrating their 25th year of doing it all their own way.

Well beloved in Fort Wayne, the band last played here in early 2020. In the midst of a quickly-selling-out national tour, they'll bring the familiar marathon jams that their legions of fans love back to The Clyde Theatre on Jan. 26. But they've also got something new up their collective sleeve.

INTRODUCING NEW SOUND

Umphrey's are Brendan Bayliss and Jake Cinninger on guitars and vocals, Joel Cummins on keyboards and vocals, Andy Farag on percussion, Kris Myers on drums and vocals, and Ryan Stasik on bass.

Like their band colleagues Phish, what has set Umphrey's apart is a duality between crafting meticulously composed, intricate progressive rock on one hand and open-ended trippy improvisation on the other. Prog band, jam band, or both for the same price of admission? Well, it seems that a couple of years of not being able to tour, but continuing to reach their fans through livestreaming songs they had written during the day, added a third dimension to their music.

They've released two albums with music they have not been able to play out much before this tour. It started with 2021's *You Walked Up Shaking in Your Boots But You Stood Tall and Left a Raging Bull.* It's a collection of 12

instrumental pieces based on walk-on music the band had been playing live going back to 2009. Ranging from three to six minutes, and built on short rhythmic themes, Umphrey's play them with crisp, clean textures. I found these tracks very enjoyable for those of us with a shorter attention span than what's required for those sprawling jam-band excursions.

Along with music from that album, Umphrey's are also able to perform pieces from their July 2022 release Asking for a Friend, which brings us more focused, concise music: not instrumentals, but pop songs, with heart-felt, introspective vocals, all between three to five minutes. They are breezy yacht rock textures with an undeniable '70s-into-'80s feel, clean electric guitars, piano, and layered percussion. Unexpected appearances of soaring, saturated arena rock guitar breaks pump you up. Verses, choruses, bridges, catchy tunes, tons of hooks, the whole radiofriendly package, if there were still radio stations that would play them. Who knew a jam band could display this kind of range? I have to tell you, it's refreshing, even to a veteran prog rock devotee like myself.

KEEPING IN TOUCH WITH FANS

If you are a loyal fan but haven't followed these developments, Umphrey's have documented intimate details about writing and recording all this music, week-by-week. First that was through broadcasts on Sirius XM's Jam On 309 channel, and later in hours of podcasts that fans can download and stream. Look online for the "Umphrey's McGee: Talking Circles" series from Osiris Media.

"There was a huge excitement and motivation when we got back together again," Cummins said about coming out of the pandemic.

"More than ever, we realized how much we needed each other and this music."

Myers added: "This album reflects how our songwriting has really come a long way since the days of putting 'Legos' together, a term given to explain our past process of assembling the greater sum of the parts in eclectic fashion. Instead, we were able to naturally connect with these songs with our hearts and a little less from our heads through simple, serene songs."

In taking this easily understandable and straightforward music off into the metaverse, last year Umphrey's offered fans a limited edition opportunity that I can't sort out for you. It's no longer available, but you could bid on of non-fungible tokens that entitled you, among many other benefits, to download individual recording tracks from the songs on the album. Musician fans were invited to import these tracks, or stems, into their digital audio workstations and re-record and mix them at will. You can read about it at www.AFAF.io, a website the band set up. Fans who bought in were also randomly selected to win copies of the vinyl test pressing, handwritten lyrics, the sheet music and charts the band read from in the studio, and concert tickets.

All this is from the band that has made recordings of virtually every concert they've ever given available for sale, download, and streaming. For 10 years they've released an annual collection of four or five hours of live concert highlights in a series called *Hall of Fame Class of ...*, which features their trademark extended instrumental jams.

OPENER NOT ALL DOOM AND GLOOM

It's quite a notable opportunity to see Umphrey's in an intimate theater like The Clyde as the band heads out into bigger and bigger venues, arenas, and festivals.

From Feb. 6-12 they will be headlining the sold-out 19th annual Jam Cruise out of Miami, sailing to the Dominican Republic. In March, they'll be doing a three-night stand in Aspen, Colorado. In June they're playing two nights at the massive Red Rocks Amphitheatre in Denver, then on to the Bonnaroo festival in Manchester, Tennessee, and the Peach Festival in Scranton, Pennsylvania.

But back to the show at The Clyde, Umphrey's have yet one more trick up their sleeve: the opening act.

Stasik is opening the show with his band, the evocatively-named Doom Flamingo.

Based in Charleston, South Carolina, Stasik describes them as a project that started out as an '8os-style "synthwave beast" creating dark dance music reminiscent of the soundtracks John Carpenter composed for his horror films, with some Jan Hammer-esque *Miami Vice* textures thrown in.

Well, they might be overstating their case: Stasik brings not only Ross Bogan on synthesizers but also flame-throwing R&B singer Kanika Moore, saxophonist Mike Quinn, guitarist Thomas Kenney, and drummer Sean Bing, so there's plenty of organic and groovy music-making to carry along the geeky dark synthesizer vibe and B-movie sci-fi themes.

All this and a jam band, too. See you there.

Strays

While I knew the name, I was unfamiliar with Margo Price's music. I did know she fell under the "country" genre, but that did not scare me off.



I'm very pleased that I was brave enough to give Strays a try.

From the get-go, you know you're in for something good on Price's fourth album, as "Been to the Mountain" kicks off with a menacing guitar riff and Ray Manzarek-esque keyboard. The lyrics let you know this is not your modern-day country. This is Americana/outlaw country.

Tom Petty & The Heartbreakers' Mike Campbell joins her on "Light Me Up," a heartfelt ditty, followed by the excellent "Radio," featuring Sharon Van Etten, which is one of the catchiest efforts on the album, but a surefire hit.


The Americana vibe returns on "Change of Heart," and "County Road" conjures up thoughts of Fleetwood Mac.

My favorite track is "Time Machine," which I had to listen to a second time before proceeding on, which is saying something, considering this record does not have a bad song. Price taps into indie rock on this track with some strategic keys giving this a light, fun feel.

Price comes back with a heavier tone on "Hell in the Heartland": "We've been building something intangible/All we had was faith; Some days I just want to destroy it all; Watch it all blow away." Another excellent track.

"Anytime You Call" with Lucius is a piano-driven song, which leads into "Lydia" and closer "Landfill," with its steel guitar and dreamlike aura that is a perfect ending to a near-perfect album. — Anthony Gadson

the Sunshine State. While northerners flock to FLA on summer and spring breaks, the townies toiled and tussled in garages and practice spaces in overwhelming humidity creating a genre of music that put a spotlight on the dark side of life. Bands like Morbid Angel, Death, Deicide, Cannibal Corpse, and Savatage built an extreme music scene, much like the Bay Area scene that gave us Metallica, Exodus, Slayer, and Death Angel.

One band that came from that scene is Obituary. Formed in 1984 with brothers John and Donald Tardy, Obituary made extreme metal that followed the path of Savatage while pushing into thrash and death metal. Nearly 40 years on, the band is still making solid metal and still has original members: the Tardy brothers, as well as

guitarist Trevor Peres.


Dying of Everything doesn't see the Florida band mellowing in their old age. It's still consistently extreme, with John Tardy's bloody belch of a voice and in your face delivery as the band combines punk rock and death metal flawlessly.

Dying of Everything is 45 minutes of technical precision, blood-drenched angst and blunt force trauma to the eardrums. "Barely Alive" sounds like what you'd imagine it would: a barbedwire panic attack with bloodcurdling screams, frenetic drumming, and guitar pyrotechnics. There's no signs of aging here. "The Wrong Time" drops the BPMs a bit but never lets up in the extreme chugging guitars or John Tardy's pulpit-spitting vocals.

The 10 tracks never give into the temptation to slow down or take it easy. "Without a Conscious" has a very modern sound, veering into Knocked Loose territory, while title track "Dying of Everything" has a very raw, live feel. "Weaponize the Hate" is like a freight train on fire going full blast toward a quiet village, relentless in the heaviness. "Be Warned" closes out the album with chugging guitars and sludgy doom metal tempo.

After nearly 40 years, Obituary continue to hone their brand of heavy thrash metal. I don't know what Florida did to these kids, but it must've been something else. *Dying of Everything* is another story told in their thrash metal terms. — *J. Hubner*

Anti-Flag Lies They Tell Our Children





Scuffling to get a permanent lineup in the early days, things stabilized with founders Justin Sane and Pat Thetic being joined by Chris Barker and Chris Head by 1999. Including 1996's debut *Die for the Government*, the punk-activist group has put out 13 albums, including this latest effort.

While they have been a left-wing group, they seem to take on everyone in the opening number, "Sold Everything." Beginning with a two-part harmony between Sane and Barker accompanied by guitar, they have not-so kid-friendly words for "all their borders" and "all their wars," leaving no one safe from their disdain with, "The violence of Wall Street/And profiteer cure; The neo-liberal saviors/Murdoch and Fox News."

The theme continues throughout *Lies They Tell Our Children*, with some heavy punk sound and snarling vocals coming through on such numbers as "Modern Meta Medicine," but the song is also intertwined with some pop-punk, that calls for more sing-alongs than old-school punk attitude.

"Victory or Death (We Gave Them Hell)" is a fun song, bringing to mind Irish ballads, but again, production and the call-outs just seem to

Dutch band Golden Earring is another one of those bands that is strongly associated



with "one-hit wonders." But when you get into this ninth release, you will find out more about these hard rockers as they explored folk and psychedelic.

Opening with the heavy "Candy's Going Bad," the band takes you on a rock n' roll journey in the same way Blue Oyster Cult did during the same decade. Stories were told as guitars wailed in the background, proving Golden Earring were more than just "Radar Love," which opened the other side of this record. Even the keyboards were well thought out behind the jazzy percussion that the song evolves into.

The band borrows Pink Floyd's vibe in "Are You Receiving Me" as it also crawls around for almost 10 minutes. Was it psychedelic or heavy folk? Hard to decide as the saxophone always throws me off. Side One closes with "Suzy Lunacy," a trippy number that is roadhousemeets-blues-rock before you flip it over for "Radar Love."

What can I say more about "Radar Love," one of the best driving songs ever written? I don't think I'll tire from hearing this track as it grabs the wheel and violently spins you around for over six minutes while you just try to hang on.

"Just Like Vince Taylor" is a direct acknowledgment of the mentioned artist in the title, who influenced David Bowie and Iggy Pop. The final track of this tour de force is "Vanilla Queen" which hobbles around for almost 10 minutes.

I listened to the wonderful psychedelic arrangement in this track on headphones in ninth grade after smoking something. It makes me really appreciate engineers and producers from an era of rock n' roll that barely has a pulse.

Again, not a bad track on this one from a groovy band from The Netherlands. — *Dennis Donahue*

Frontman Fat Mike confirmed this in a press release, "This is not a final tour like Mötley Crüe or Black Sabbath. These are the very




industry.

Happy as I am for Yeoh (one of my first crushes, even), I'm not sure she stands a chance of beating Blanchett when they inevitably get nominated for the Best Actress Oscar.

BEST ACTOR

In the biggest surprise of the night, Austin Butler (Elvis) beat out Brendan Fraser (The Whale) for Best Actor in a Drama. Again, category fraud. Butler should not have been nominated in the Drama category.

Regardless, Butler beat out Jeremy Pope (The Inspection), Bill Nighy (Living), Hugh Jackman (The Son), and, of course, one of the Globes' biggest critics, Fraser. Meanwhile, Colin Farrell won Best Actor in a Musical/ Comedy for his brilliant performance in The Banshees of Inisherin, beating out Diego Calva (Babylon), Daniel Craig (Glass Onion), Adam Driver (White Noise), and Ralph Fiennes (The Menu). Weird nominees this year, no? I think the Oscar race will come down to Fraser vs. Farrell. No clue who wins. There's also an outside theory that Elvis wins several big awards on Oscar night, with Butler winning Best Actor. I very much hope that doesn't happen, but understand that a win like that is probably seen as "good for Hollywood." Eww.

BEST DIRECTOR

Steven Spielberg won Best Director for The Fabelmans, beating out James Cameron (Avatar: The Way of Water), Daniel Kwan/Daniel Scheinert (Everything Everywhere All at Once), Baz Luhrmann (Elvis), and Martin McDonagh (The Banshees of Inisherin). I'm mostly just happy that Cameron didn't win, but really would have been happy with McDonagh or The Daniels winning. 




Narcissism at center of indie film

laying at Cinema Center this weekend, the indie dramedy When You Finish Saving the World stars Stranger Things' Finn Wolfhard as Ziggy Katz, a high school student desperately trying to discover him-

Using a livestreaming platform called Hi-Hat, he routinely performs original music for his 20,000 followers all over the world, which doesn't quite register with his





acters, the phrase that gives When You Finish Saving the World its name is fitting for a movie whose two primary protagonists are unknowingly narcissistic and self-righteous. The central irony of the story is that despite this common ground, Ziggy and Evelyn have a stilted relationship where they just can't seem to see themselves in one another. It's obvious that the pair will reach some kind of reconciliation by the end of the brisk 87-minute runtime, but thanks to a pithy script by writer-director Jesse Eisenberg, the journey getting there is piquant and piercing. Adapting from his Audible audio drama of the same name, Eisenberg restructures his story around the mother-son dysfunction that has the most narrative potency.

Views

Along the way, When You Finish Saving the World pokes fun at the wince-inducing paths that young people often take in trying to figure out who they want to be. Ziggy and Lila meet up multiple times at a "Revolutionary Arts" gathering, a sort of open mic where over-earnest teens trade spoken-word and song-based offerings in an effort to one-up each other. "This is about the patriarchy, of which I'm a reluctant member," a young boy dramatically laments before sharing a poem. When it's Ziggy's turn to perform an original tune, his lyrics about graduating and loneliness fall flat for an audience preening for something more sociopolitically enlightened. Still, he remains undeterred and his braggadocious passes at Lila contribute to the film's finest moments of cringe comedy.

In juxtaposing his day-to-day with Evelyn's, Eisenberg suggests that she isn't any less guilty than her son of trying too hard when it comes to social interactions. She often comes off so severe to most that when she attempts to make small talk with a Spruce Haven secretary while waiting for an elevator, the receptionist feels the need to clarify that she's not about to be terminated. Moore adds all sorts of touches to her performance that help us understand how someone so stern in their usual disposition could still come across as empathetic in specific contexts. She exudes the expected patience and understanding during intake with abuse survivors, but when Ziggy says he needs "five seconds" to get ready, Evelyn looks down at her watch and counts to five in her head before walking out the door.

Though the film takes place in Indiana (Bloomington,

specifically) and there are allusions to IU and the Pacers, When You Finish Saving the World was shot in both New Mexico and Canada, likely due to their respective tax incentives for the film industry.

Eisenberg reportedly moved to Bloomington with his wife, Anna, during the pandemic lockdown of 2020 and his newfound affection for the area and its people come through in his directorial debut. It's unfortunate that Indiana is one of 16 states that doesn't extend tax incentive programs for film productions, even for smaller-budget projects like this one. Until that changes, Hoosiers will likely have to settle for the occasional movie like When You Finish Saving the World that is set here, even if it's not actually shot in-state.


