Sail On over to Embassy for night of yacht rock

Orleans. Peter Beckett. Walter Egan will perform all their hits on July 26

There was a time about a million years ago when every junior high dance would feature the song "Dance With Me" by Orleans.

It's a sweet, gentle tune that encourages that first tentative slow dance without too much suggestive pressure. If you were the right age for that experience, that song can instantly pull old memories back from the data bank in your brain.

Those memories will flood Embassy Theatre on Friday, July 26, during Sail On: The Original Yacht Rock Tour with Orleans, Walter Egan, and Peter Beckett, the voice of Player.

CATCH-22 OF CREATING THEME SONG

Orleans will be playing a full set of their hits, before turning into the backing band for Egan of "Magnet and Steel" fame. They also provide the instrumentation for Beckett, best known for singing the No. 1 smash "Baby Come Back" by Player.

I caught up with founding Orleans bassist Lance Hoppen to talk about the tour.

"We're not really doing what I'd call touring," he said. "We're doing these one-off shows and sometimes two or three at a time. There's gaps in between, so we take every opportunity to rehearse. We rehearse a lot. We're still developing and trying new things. We're learning new stuff for Peter and Walter, and it's always good to refresh our skills on our own things.'

If you're the right age for "Dance With Me," you will probably also remember the year that ABC made Orleans' "Still the One" the centerpiece of their marketing campaign. In the days of three commercial stations and no DVR, you heard that song incessantly. It was so successful that ABC used it two more seasons.

"The yin/yang of that is this: It certainly did a lot in terms of becoming part of Americana," Hoppen said. "That song has an endless life. But when ABC used it for their theme song, it enabled (co-founding Orleans member) John Hall to make up his mind to leave the band. It was a writer's deal. We weren't on any of the soundalike recordings and snippets. He just felt like he should move on. That was a mistake in retrospect, for us and for John. But, so it goes."

FOLLOWING BIG BROTHER

Playing bass for Orleans was Hoppen's first job out of high school. He came from a musical family and started playing gigs at 14 while his older brother Larry was heading off to college.

Larry's college career ended early, and that changed Lance's life.

"Larry went to college and he dropped out," Hoppen said. "He actually dropped out twice. He didn't want to be there. He didn't want to be a

teacher. He wanted to be a player. And I got that. So when I didn't want to go to college, even though I could have, my parents didn't make me go.

"My dream was not to be rich or famous. It was to be a working professional musician, and hopefully do it with Larry. Lo and behold, that's what happened."

Larry founded Orleans with Hall, and once Lance graduated high school, he was given an audition and quickly joined the band.

"Nepotism didn't hurt," he joked.

PRODUCING HITS

Orleans immediately started recording and self-produced their second album at legendary Bearsville Studios in New York.

However, their label was not impressed.

"They didn't like the record at all, so they didn't release it," Hoppen said. "The irony is that it had the first versions of both 'Let There Be Music' and 'Dance With Me' on it. And they just didn't hear

"When we got re-signed by Asylum, they heard what those songs could be if produced properly. It

wasn't the songs, it was the production, and those became a minor hit and a big hit."

Orleans is more than just a first job to Hoppen. Maintaining the heritage is important.

"This quintet, that I am the leader of now with John having retired from the road, carries on the legacy," he said. "The thread of the music is still intact. Even though it's not the '70s version or the '90s version or whatever, it's this version of Orleans and people are responding really, really well

"I'm really confident and pleased with how this band performs these songs, so we'll be bringing that to Fort Wayne."

Band Camino pulling into Clyde

Alternative band will perform with Knox on July 26

Alternative rock fans are getting revved up for The Band Camino's upcoming show in Fort Wayne.

The trio of Jeffrey Jordan, Spencer Stewart, and Garrison Burgess embarked on their The Taking Shape tour this month. On Friday, July 26, the trek makes its way to The Clyde Theatre with Knox opening the show up.

NEW APPROACH

The tour comes on the heels of the band's recent EP release of *Bruises*, featuring the single "Nostalgia."

"Fresh starts are hard to come by when you've been a band for nine years and almost all of your 20s, but this release truly feels like one," the band said in a statement. "Honestly, for a while it felt like we were chasing something. Having a fan base and any amount of success puts this pressure on your art, and it's easy to start chasing and predicting what you think people are going to like. But in this next chapter we've decided we aren't chasing anything at all—just expressing."

The three-song EP comes on the heels of 2023's *The Dark*, which featured "Told You So," "What Am I Missing," "Last Man in the World," and "See You Later."

While that album guided fans through a trek into darkness, *Bruises* carries a different vibe.

"Making these songs and this EP brought us together in a way we haven't felt in a long time honestly," they said in a collective statement. "We took the process back to the place we started as a band and wrote and arranged the songs in a live rehearsal setting to truly create them together with instruments in our hands."

That process included old-school recording.

"Making music in 2024 has mostly turned into sitting in front of a computer, so we really put in effort to make music with no computers in sight until it was time to hit the studio with a fully-fleshed out arrangement," they said. "We tracked everything live as a band

and left the takes as raw as we could. Our live show has always been what we're most proud of, so we really just wanted to capture that in these recordings and not over complicate or overproduce anything. A touch more humanness, imperfectly perfect."

GAINING TRACTION

Prior to feeling any pressure to create, The Band Camino formed in 2015 as Jordan and Spencer were University of Memphis students with Graham Rowell and Andrew Isbell.

They released the EPs My

Thoughts on You in 2016 and Heaven in 2017.

Shortly after *Heaven*'s release, Isbell departed the band and was replaced by Burgess on drums.

The band caught the attention of Elektra Records, who signed the band in 2019 and released the *tryhard* EP the same year.

While this should have been a good time for the band, Rowell was dismissed from the group amid sexual misconduct allegations.

Forging ahead, they released their debut full-length self-titled album in 2021. On the strength of singles "Roses," "1 Last Cigarette," "Sorry Mom," and "Know It All," the group's fan base continued to grow.

By the time of *The Dark*'s release in 2023, The Band Camino were playing Bonnaroo Music Festival and embarking on a headlining tour.

Now, you'll get your chance to see this band described as electropop.

Decorated musician Warren Haynes stops by Clyde

From Allman Brothers to Govt. Mule, guitarist has had fruitful career

Prepare for a long, memorable night when Warren Haynes Band performs Wednesday, July 24, at The Clyde Theatre.

It's an "Evening With" concert featuring the veteran singer-songwriter-guitarist and his backing unit. Count on Haynes to touch on each era of his long career.

ALL IN ON ALLMAN BROTHERS

Haynes, 64, is known for his work with Govt. Mule, The Allman Brothers Band, and The Dead, among other recording artists.

"We're going to draw from all sorts of material," Haynes said. "I'll play songs from my solo records and so much more. You know I can't ignore the Govt. Mule and Allman Brothers songs."

Count on Haynes to toss in some covers.

"It's going to be a great mix of things," Haynes said while calling from his home in West Chester, New York. "It's been so much fun playing such a variety of material."

The setlist will be different with each show. "I always like to mix things up," he said. "It's great to have so much to draw from. It's been quite a career."

Haynes loves paying tribute to The Allman Brothers, who had such an impact on his life.

"I'll always have a soft spot for the Allmans since they gave me the biggest break of my career," he said. "I wouldn't be where I am without them."

Haynes was tabbed by Dickey Betts to perform backing vocals on his 1988 album, *Pattern Disruptive*. Betts invited Haynes to become part of his band a year later. When The Allman Brothers Band reunited, Betts recruited Haynes to be part of the group.

"That was a huge opportunity," Haynes said. "I owe so much to Dickey Betts. He was an incredible musician and an even better person."

Betts passed away at 80 in April, and Haynes took it hard.

"Dickey no longer being here is a huge loss," Haynes said. "I've known Dickey since 1981 and played with his band before joining The Allman Brothers Band. I was a huge Allman Brothers fan when I was growing up and I got to meet them through Dickey. That set me on this path where I'm fortunate enough to do what I love. I've been on this incredible journey that I appreciate."

GOOD TIMES KEEP ROLLING

Haynes has accomplished a great deal during his varied career, including co-writing



"Two of a Kind, Working on a Full House" for Garth Brooks, which was one of the country icon's hits on his massive 1990 album *No Fonces*

Haynes also made his mark as a recording artist with Govt. Mule, as a guitar hero with the Allmans, and has played live with Dave Matthews Band and Tedeschi Trucks Band. He has recorded with such legends as Dolly Parton, Peter Frampton, and even William Shatner.

So what is left for Havnes to accomplish?

"There is still more to do," Haynes said. "I'm proud of what I've done, but there is some cool things I'd like to accomplish.

"I'm so glad that Govt. Mule finally made a blues album. It was so cool that album (2021's *Heavy Load Blues*) was nominated for a Grammy (for Best Traditional Blues Album). But we still haven't done our jazz album.

"Right now, I'm writing and creating new music. I'm excited about the future."

The future is a gig at The Clyde.

"I love playing at the Clyde," Haynes said. "What impresses me is that it's always a rockin' crowd. We always play to such a great audience in Fort Wayne, but I don't know why. I've played all over the world, and Fort Wayne is amazing. I'm just so glad I ended up on this path in which I became a musician."

'BEYOND MY WILDEST DREAMS'

Growing up in Asheville, North Carolina, Haynes became hooked on music when he was 7 years old.

"That's when I first started singing," he said. "What I mostly sang was soul music. I used to sing James Brown songs. James was my first musical hero."

However, by the time he was 11, Haynes' musical taste shifted.

"Rock music just spoke to me," Haynes said. "I became interested in the guitar, and I just couldn't put it down.

"You know how some kids just pick up an instrument and get bored with it and leave it

behind? That wasn't the way it was with me and the guitar. I was always fascinated by it. That led me to forming a band when I was 14 years old."

By the time he was 17, Haynes was on tour.

"It's a life that just always appealed to me," he said. "There is nothing like getting on stage or creating and recording music. It's paid off."

Haynes has won a pair of Grammy Awards, played in front of 350,000 at Woodstock '94, and was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame with The Allman Brothers in 1995.

"There are so many highlights in my career," Haynes said. "All that I've experienced is beyond my wildest dreams."

NOT FINISHED

But it all goes back to writing songs, which is what Haynes has always been passionate about since he became a touring musician.

"I love to write, and I write the majority of the songs (for Govt. Mule and solo project)," Haynes said. "Some of the songs are collaborations. I enjoy the whole songwriting process. I think back to what Gregg Allman used to say, which is, "There are as many ways to write a song as there are songs."

"I like to write at home when we're off the road. But I'm often on the road, and I've learned how to make myself write when I'm away from home as well. I've learned how to write on a tour bus, which is a good thing since I spend countless hours on that bus."

Haynes has always been an open-minded musician who devours many different styles of music. He believes being a sponge to eclectic music helped him find himself, and he advises young musicians to be receptive to many genres.

"I tell anyone who wants to be a musician that they should listen to as many different types of music as possible," Haynes said. "That's the way you find yourself as a musician. It worked for me. I started out listening to soul and then blues, jazz, and rock music, and then folk music. All of what I consumed turned me into the musician I am today."

Haynes is armed for more as a musician. Some amazing music has been crafted over recent years by seniors. Such icons as Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen, and Neil Young, along with a number of other elder rockers are creating compelling, fascinating music into their twilight years.

"It's true," Haynes said. "When I was growing up, rock was a young man's game, but things have changed, and I'm so glad since I have so much more to say and contribute as a musician."





Hawthorne Heights have overcome 20 Years of Tears

Emo rockers will bring full slate of bands with them to Clyde Theatre

20 Years of Tears is an apt title for Hawthorne Heights' tour, which stops by The Clyde Theatre on Thursday, July 25, with Thursday, Anberlin, Armor for Sleep, Stick to Your Guns and This Wild Life.

Hawthorne Heights are an emo band that have enjoyed commercial and critical success over their two-decade run.

They emerged from the out-of-the-way musical hotbed of Dayton, Ohio, which also spawned indie rock legends Guided By Voices, fronted by the brilliant Robert Pollard, and the seminal Breeders.

But Hawthorne Heights veered in another direction. The group, which was influenced by such larger than life emo figures as Sunny Day Real Estate, forged their own path.

"We certainly do things our own way," frontman J.T. Woodruff said. "Fortunately it worked out."

PLENTY OF RESOLVE

Hawthorne Heights, which also includes bassist Matt Ridenour, guitarist Mark McMillon, and drummer Chris Popadek, enjoyed considerable success out of the gate.

The band's first two albums, 2004's *The Silence in Black and White* and 2006's *If Only You Were Lonely*, went gold. The latter album's initial single, the infectious "Saying Sorry" also went gold.

The music industry changed during the aughts and so did Hawthorne Heights' lineup. The band have weathered personnel alterations and other hardships. They overcame the agony of guitarist Casey Calvert's death in 2007. Calvert was found dead on the band's tour bus at the age of 26. The band spent only a few days mourning before carrying on.

Perhaps it's not surprising how much resolve Hawthorne Heights possess.

Woodruff, who came of age in a small, rural West Virginia city of St. Marys along the Ohio River, is stronger than most, perhaps due to his background.

"I grew up in a trailer in a small town and we didn't have a lot," Woodruff said. "I was a child of divorce. We didn't have material things, but we had love. I think I appreciate it all since I didn't have much as a kid. I can deal with the ups and downs of life."

Experience provides fodder for songs.

"Ohio Is for Lovers," "The Transition," and "Wake Up Call" are tunes from *The Silence in Black and White*, which are relatable and full of hooks.

"We just try to write the best songs that we can," Woodruff said. "The fact that we're still at this all these years after we formed proves that we're fine."

DIVERSE DISCOGRAPHY

Like another of the band's heroes, Jimmy Eat World, Hawthorne Heights have been remarkably consistent.

Their 2008 album, Fragile Future, proved the band could succeed following the loss of Calvert. The album features some of Hawthorne Heights' darkest and heaviest songs, such as "Rescue Me," "Somewhere in Between," and "Desperation." Fragile Future is arguably Hawthorne Height's deepest album.

In 2010, they released *Skeletons*, which features a more mature Hawthorne Heights, featuring strong songwriting and lyrics that are raw and vulnerable. Hawthorne Heights put themselves out there in a way few bands are brave enough to attempt. "Bring You Back" and "Gravestones" are well-constructed anthems.

Hawthorne Heights upped the ante with 2013's Zero, which is a dystopian, post-hard-core concept album about teens known as the Zero Collective, who battle oppressive corporate America in the near-future. Concept records are few and far between, and they aren't easy to execute. But Hawthorne Heights knocked it out of the park with Zero.

In 2018, they released *Bad Frequencies*, which is filled with angst-ridden tunes with big choruses.

The Rain Just Follows Me from 2021 is filled with ringing melodies and visceral guitar riffs.

"We recorded that album in Orange County (California) and that had a big impact on it," Woodruff said. "We were staying at a beach house in Newport Beach, and I would get up every morning before anyone else and I would sit on the beach and reflect about some of the worst things I went through over the last 20 years. I would sit there and think about all the things I usually had no time to think about, including the passing of Casey.

"I was still writing lyrics, and I suffered by looking back, but it helped make the album better. A lot of times in life we're moving so quickly and working and doing so much that we have these memories of things we never dealt with. It's good to actually go back and deal with stuff. In my case, it was very productive doing that."

LIFE-CHANGING SONG

Woodruff can go back and recall creating "Ohio Is For Lovers" off their debut. He had no idea the tune would resonate with so many fans

"We had no idea that song would catch on," Woodruff said. "When we were in the studio we only had the instrumental of the song. I was getting yelled at by the producer when I wrote those lyrics. He was saying, 'Your singer doesn't even have the lyrics to that song. I don't know why we're working on it.' I had just come up with the words about 10 minutes before he said that. I told him that I had the lyrics and he said, 'Well, I haven't heard it. Sing it.' I sang the lyrics and it worked out.

"I'm sure there are many stories like that one. Sometimes it's best to just be in the moment. You surprise yourself how things work out. Who knew that song would catch on with anybody, but it worked out for us."

"Ohio Is For Lovers" was a staple on MTV in 2005. The music network had the power to launch a band out of nowhere, which was the case for Hawthorne Heights.

"When that song was embraced it was like being part of a rocket and we just had to hold on," Woodruff said. "Everything happened so fast. All of a sudden we were playing on MTV and on the cover of magazines. We were headlining the Warped tour. It was an incredible time, and the cool thing is that it's still great. It's just different."

It's a completely different era in 2024. MTV has replaced videos with reality shows and Warped Tour, which showcased an eclectic batch of bands, is no more.

However, some bands from that era are still around and Hawthorne Heights is one of those.

"It's great to still be creating music and touring," Woodruff said. "I still appreciate every minute of this."

There is no surrender in Black Flag

Hardcore punk outfit will stop at Piere's on July 26

Punk rock in the 1970s sprang up in the underground scenes of London, New York, and Los Angeles. Each city's music had its own sound, but they all had one thing in common: the unpredictability of their shows.

As if to prove that point, multiple times in their history, before and after the presence of dynamic lead singer Henry Rollins, Black Flag have replaced their singer mid-show.

The current iteration features one of those stories: vocalist Mike Vallely joins founding father Greg Ginn, the creative force behind Black Flag throughout their history, when they come to Piere's on Friday, July 26, as part of their The First Four Years Tour.

REHASHING HIT ALBUM

Vallely's story is every bit as wild as you could hope for a hardcore punk rock story to be.

Well known at the time as a pro skater, he sang songs from Black Flag's iconic *My War* album with the band in a 2003 reunion benefit show. Ten years later, acting as the band's manager during an Australian reunion tour, Vallely came on stage and fired lead singer Ron Reyes during a show, replacing him on the spot to finish the set.

Vallely has been the lead singer next to Ginn since, maintaining a steady touring schedule before and after the pandemic.

On this tour, they are performing *My War* in its entirety, followed by a selection of early Black Flag classics.

Just as The Clash's *London Calling* signaled their move away from their roots, *My War* was a departure from the predictable simplicity of their earlier sound.

Along with an A-side of traditionally up-tempo thrashers, Ginn stretched his creativity on Side B with unconventional time signatures, dragging tempos, and extended solos.

Not every Black Flag fan was on-board with this newly sophisticated sound, and contemporary critics made obvious references to Bob Dylan going electric in 1965.

LASTING LEGACY

Ginn has been the constant presence and creative driver of Black Flag since its founding in 1976.

Along with Rollins, that time included five different lead singers, three of whom have rotated in and out more than once. They were early proponents of the hardcore DIY scene, which meant producing your own records.

Ginn owned a small business selling electronic equipment which he turned into record label SST in 1978 in order to have control over their music.

SST became an influential part of the L.A. hardcore scene, and shows often included violence, drawing the continuous attention of LAPD. After a disastrous legal dispute around the rights to their first album, *Damaged*, Ginn spent five days in jail for violating an injunction not to release his own music.

After producing some early releases from other L.A. hardcore bands, SST struck gold in 1984 when they produced the first two albums for Minneapolis-based Hüsker Dü, poised to take over college campuses everywhere in the mid '80s.

Black Flag's influence goes well beyond their indie label. Nirvana frontman Kurt Cobain listed Black Flag as one of his influences. Maynard James Keenan of Tool credits their music with changing the direction of his life. The Red Hot Chili Peppers are known to use the stylized Black Flag logo as a tribute.

That logo became iconic in the punk scene of the '80s because it was graffitied everywhere. Its four bars evoke a rippling flag, and its primary meaning is clear: A white flag means surrender, and a black flag is the opposite.

There had never been anything like a Black Flag show in their early days, and there probably hasn't been anything like it since. I seriously doubt that many of their diehard fans would relish that experience these days anyway. But the music is still there, and the attitude is still punk rock.

You never know, somebody might get fired mid-show.

Blackberry Smoke play sweet rock

Southern rockers bring unique blend of music to Sweetwater Pavilion

Through tireless work and relentless touring, Blackberry Smoke have become one of the leading Southern rock bands.

Forming in Atlanta in 2000, the Blackberry Smoke have attracted fans across the world with full-throttle live shows and classic yet fresh sound.

That touring schedule will lead them to Sweetwater Performance Pavilion on Friday, July 26, as part of their extensive Be Right Here Tour.

PEELING BACK LAYERS

Blackberry Smoke are criss-crossing the country in support of their latest album, *Be Right Here*, released in February.

Their eighth studio album has been described as continuation of their musical journey, "elevating their trademark blend of blues, Southern rock, and Americana that has helped them sustain a fruitful, more than two-decade-long career," said American Songwriter. Whiskey Riff declared, "Their distinctively Southern rock sound and toptier songwriting always comes through," while Entertainment Focus calls the album "an enticing glimpse into the musical journey that awaits listeners."

Be Right Here was recorded live in studio,

resulting in another raw and organic release full of heartfelt songs with honest lyrics.

This process is preferred by the band and primary songwriter, lead guitarist and singer Charlie Starr.

"Think about the James Gang and the *Layla* record by Derek and The Dominos," Starr said of the album. "I want all the amps around the drums in the room. I want everything in the big room, no separation."

The finished product feels familiar. However, like peeling back another layer on an onion, the album reveals more about the band than ever before as they continue to add colors to their palette.

While it may seem a bit of a departure from the commercially successful predecessor *You Hear Georgia*, *Be Right Here* is everything the band wanted it to be and more.

"We all started to grin," Starr told *Loudersound* of the first time they listened to it. "Because I remember thinking, 'This is going to be different. It's like making a '60s record — we're all in here and it's warts and all.'

"We walked into the control room to listen to the first track, and everybody was grinning, like, 'OK, this will work.'"

'PLAYING SOUTHERN MUSIC'

Blackberry Smoke released their debut album, *Bad Luck Ain't No Crime*, in 2003 and have gone on to record seven more studio albums, doing much of the work as an independent artist.

Their 2015 record *Holding All the Roses* was the first independently released album to top the *Billboard* Country Albums chart in the modern era which they repeated with *Like an Arrow* in 2016.

The seeds were sown with those albums and now the band is enjoying the fruits of their labor in the form the critical and commercial success.

Their ability to continue to appeal to a wide range of audiences with each album is a result of a unified vision and refusal to be pigeonholed into one genre or style of music.

Starr told *Arts ATL* that whether someone calls them Southern rock, country, country rock, or something else, he gets it, because that is how people categorize music, but he may not always agree.

"I don't know if I really can define our music," he said. "People call us a Southern rock band, and that's cool, as long as they don't

think that can sort of marginalize or box us in.

"Personally, when I think of The Allman Brothers or the Marshall Tucker Band, they are so different," he told *Arts ATL*. "Then you think of Blackfoot. That's an R&B band and a hard rock band and blues band and a jazz band and a country band. So, I just think of us as playing Southern music."

FORMING SETLIST

While some bands that tour as much as Blackberry Smoke have revealed members try to stay separated on tour to keep their sanity, such is not the case with these guys. They are friends and are still fond of each other, even after a couple of decades of long bus rides.

"You could give us 10 dressing rooms in a venue and we always wind up in one," Starr said. "We enjoy each other's company. Maybe not every second of every day, but we're friends.

"I constantly get asked, 'How do you keep a band together this long?' I'm like, 'I don't know how, but I know we love each other.' And it's real, you know?"

As for the live show, fans can expect to hear a mix of songs featuring the hits as well as some songs that may be a little more obscure.

From night to night, the band plays what feels right, knowing the audience will come along for the ride.

"I truly have no idea on what people want to hear," Starr told *Arts ATL*. "I wouldn't know where to begin to start second-guessing what people might like.

"Joe Bonamassa is a great friend, and he also has a very varied audience. He was interviewing me for his podcast and asked me, 'Do you tailor-make your playlist for your audience and for the situation? Or do you do like the Blues Brothers and say, 'Screw it and go for it'?' I told him that many years ago I used to try to plan for the audience, but it was a massive failure every time. So now, for the past 20 years or so, I just say, 'You know, this is what we do. You either like it or you don't."

Sankofa

5 Mugs of Doom

A month would not be complete without another dope drop from one of the Midwest's finest rappers: Sankofa.



Sankofa, aka Ste-

phen Bryden, has a discography epic in scope and feel. Sankofa is a die-hard believer in the concept of collaboration. He comes from the philosophy that great art comes from working with talented friends, whether it be producers, beatmakers, graphic designers, or fellow rappers. Sankofa makes music via community.

On his June release, the killer 5 Mugs of Doom, Sankofa works with friend and producer 8Greg2. He gives Sankofa a healthy dose of killer beats and vibes to lay out some of his best rhymes yet.

With guest verses from Sko, Nord1kone, Truck North, and longtime friend/collaborator JON?DOE, 5 Mugs of Doom is yet another epic hip hop release from one of the most prolific cats in the game.

You know this one is special since Sankofa has made 5 Mugs of Doom his annual vinyl release. And really, vinyl is the perfect media for this record. The needle drop, pops, and clicks are the perfect way to hear "Laying Siege," featuring Sko, with a big beat, touches of soul courtesy of some horn samples, and the combination of Sko and Sankofa's booming delivery make for a gut punch of an opener. "Paper Straw Suckers," featuring Nordikone, lays down some serious street vibe, so much so you can almost smell the asphalt burning in the hot summer sun. "Thankful for the Fire" has Sankofa going solo, spitting his usual thoughtful rhymes over a killer beat.

The 14 tracks never relent. Each one ups the ante as they hit your ears, from the funky soul of "Spreewell Jams" to the in-your-face melancholy of "Duracell" to the absolute killer "Lack of the Draw," featuring Truck North, and its '70s street vibe production (think Adrian Younge and Ali Shaheed Muhammad).

5 Mugs of Doom offers proof in Sankofa's great taste in collaborators. 8Greg2 has given him a canvas to lay out some of his best work of the year. — J. Hubner

Same Eyes

The Slow Decline

The common refrain among old-timers like myself is, "They don't make music like that anymore."



Same Eyes out of Ann Arbor turn that sentiment on its head.

Described as dragging "soft focus synth pop directly from dreams," Same Eyes send you back to the post-punk '80s with Joy Division, The Cure, The Smiths, New Order, and the like.

I was actually introduced to them through an

Instagram story of them performing the single "Desperate Others." While that song is not actually on this album, the tone of it definitely is. Oh, and do yourself a favorite and check out "Desperate Others."

As for *The Slow Decline*, what you have here is a collection of singles vocalist Alex Hughes and multi-instrumentalist Chad Pratt worked with collaborators to release each month of 2023.

Opening with "Venice," the synths let you know what you're in for. As the keys dance, a mid-song breakdown provides an excellent change of pace. "Absence" follows with a Smiths' vibe. Hughes' vocals fit right in with that era.

Among the tracks, "For Somebody" is an absolute gem. From melancholic lyrics ("He wants to know what love is") to beautiful synths and keys, it's a beaut and would have had any emo kid shoegazing the night away.

"Never Enough" taps into some Cure guitar antics. It's another track that demands multiple listens.

Using money raised from sales of this album, the guys are planning for a full-length release in October. And if it's anything like they've been doing, I'll be there waiting to snag a copy. — *Anthony Gadson*

Strand of Oaks

Miracle Focus

Timothy Showalter has been kicking around as Strand of Oaks since his 2009 debut *Leave Ruin*.

Starting out with a folksy, singer-song-

writer vibe, Showalter shifted into more synth and pop touches on the 2010 breakthrough *Pope Killdragon*.

His Neil Young affections were replaced by those for Tangerine Dream and Kate Bush. His lyrics became more story-driven and steeped in fantasy.

But with 2014's *Heal*, Showalter saw success with a bigger, pop rock aesthetic, and with it came TV appearances and opening spots for Ryan Adams, Jason Isbell, and Iron & Wine. His songs dealt with sobriety and a need to connect and were very heart-on-sleeve.

For *Miracle Focus*, Showalter wanted to make a fun, freeing record. Influenced by everything from Alice Coltrane to Ram Dass to yoga and Freddie Mercury, Showalter wanted to make an album steeped in a free-spiritedness and mindful contemplation. It's joyful yet feels oddly stunted and stuck in low gear.

"More You" opens the record on an operatic note. Lush synth strings give Showalter a foundation to sing in an almost Mercury feel, a step away from the *Pope Killdragon* and *Heal* days. "Anada" has a hip-hop beat with a mostly minor key vibe. Even a song called "Party at Monster Lake" lingers in slow motion and dour acoustic drumming.

The album stays in a second gear and never really pushes anything into the red.

Backtracks CLASSIC ALBUMS

The 13th Floor Elevators

The Psychedelic Sounds of The 13th Floor Elevators (1966)



Austin, Texas,

gave us The 13th Floor Elevators in 1965. This was the first band to coin the term "psychedelic" as it related to music. Although they had some degree of success, they are best known for their 1966 single from this album, "You're Gonna Miss Me." You've heard it: it was the first song in the 2000 movie *High Fidelity* and was in a Dell Computers' commercial in the mid-2000s.

Roky Erickson and Tommy Hall wrote most of the music, and Hall even employed an electric jug, which would soon be their trademark sound. Janis Joplin credits them with her style and sang with them before moving to California. Acid rock bands like MC5 and Blue Cheer have the Elevators to thank for their success.

Identifying specific tracks is difficult but only because they all sort of run into each other. Imagine a band like The Byrds on LSD and Southern Comfort. That's what the Elevators were.

Notable tracks include "Reverberation" and "Now I'm Home."

Of course, they did run into some problems. Drug use was rampant. After just four records, two full-length, the band split up in 1969.

Erickson was committed in 1970 and released in 1975. He played at Austin City Limits in 2005 and Coachella in 2006, had a moderate solo career, but passed away in 2019.

This was where the psych-garage movement started, and they should be fondly remembered. — Dennis Donahue

"Switched On" has Showalter sounding like a robot singing over processed drums in all melodramatic undertones, while "Navigator" is all synth pop banging. "Ascend You" is a straight-up techno club track. If that's what you're looking for from Strand of Oaks, then you've found your summer jam right here.

Miracle Focus might have been inspired by TM, free jazz, and Showalter's newfound love for painting, but for the most part, this record sounds like a guitar guy having fun with hip-hop beats and electronics.

Unfortunately it's a middling affair, especially when you take into account Strand of Oaks' first four amazing albums. Showalter is still a great songwriter, but this release lacks urgency and staying power. — *J. Hubner*

Longlegs has right amount of creepy

fter a monthslong viral marketing campaign that put forth cryptic teaser clips and coded messages inspired by Zodiac Killer-esque symbology, the unholy and unforgettable horror-thriller *Longlegs* has crawled into theaters in its terrifying full form.

Longlegs is a film that wears its influences —Silence of the Lambs and Seven are givens — on its sleeve and one that keeps reinventing itself with every hairpin turn of the central mystery. Even with the presence of genre

stery. Even with the presence of genre stalwart Maika Monroe and perhaps the most predictably unpredictable performer around in Nicolas Cage, there's little comfort in the familiar here. There are horror movies that aim to scare audiences with spooky spontaneity and knee-jerk thrills, then there are those which actively work to unnerve and unsettle us. The latest from writer-director Osgood Perkins falls in the latter category.

Monroe stars as Lee Harker, a cloistered and committed young FBI

agent whose next-level intuition helps her quickly break open an elusive case that compels her boss Agent Carter (Blair Underwood) to assign her to one that's been even more beguiling.

Over the span of decades, a serial killer known as Longlegs (Cage) has seemingly been involved with numerous murder-suicides in the Pacific Northwest with only coded messages left behind. Harker makes quick work of the seemingly indecipherable notes and finds a pentagram-predicated pattern within the clues, although there still aren't precise signs who the killer's next victim might be.

Throughout her monomania in cracking the case, Harker maintains connection with her pious mother, Ruth (Alicia Witt), who worries that Lee chasing a devil-devout deviant may cause her to lose herself in the process.

At the outset, *Longlegs* posits itself as more of a procedural thriller before slowly morphing into art horror, with some unexpected but much-needed chuckles peppered in.

Four films in, Perkins seems to be most interested in telling scary stories from different subgenres. His *I Am the Pretty Thing That Lives in the House* was in the gothic ghost story tradition and *Gretel & Hansel* in the vein of dark fairy tale. His latest most closely resembles his 2015 outing *The Blackcoat's Daughter*, a superb supernatural chiller about two students left behind a boarding school over winter break. While *Longlegs* is somehow even creepier than that film, it's also Perkins' most accomplished work, made of moments that exude ardent craft and nuanced precision.

Everyone in front of the camera is more than game for his vision, with Monroe as our audience surrogate into this twisted tale much in the way Jodie Foster was for *Silence of the Lambs*. In films like *It Follows* and *Watcher*, Monroe plays characters who try to stay one step ahead of the evil forces stalking them. But here, her Harker is much more capable in her ability to snuff out the nefarious forces at play. As we often see in movies about detectives whose job consumes their lives, Monroe taps into the social awkwardness that comes with someone whose head is always somewhere else. Mostly it's underscored as a predominant personality trait


among the most determined agents, but sometimes it's keenly played for laughs; when Agent Carter's 8-year-old daughter asks Harker if she'd like to see her room, Perkins smash cuts to the agent sitting rigidly on the little girl's bed through social obligation.

Underwood also puts forth easy-to-overlook work as Harker's veteran superior, but I imagine one of the main hooks for those drawn in by *Longlegs* this month will be Cage, whose character's full appearance has been withheld in promotional materials. Some may complain that Cage doesn't appear in the movie more, while others may wish that he was used more sparingly. Regardless, he predictably makes a meal of his deranged and haunting character. Perkins wisely gives us swift glimpses of the towering occultist figure before giving us the squirm-inducing close-ups of Cage's face.

While it's only been out several days, *Longlegs* already seems to carry with it a staying power uncommon for the majority of current horror output.

- Streaming on Netflix is *Skywalkers: A Love Story*, a documentary involving a daring couple that travel to Malaysia to climb a 118-story skyscraper, attempting a bold acrobatic stunt on the spire to salvage their career and relationship.
